Sunday of Carpatho-Rusin (Regional) Saints Holy Martyr Maxim (Sandovich) of Gorlice (1886-1914)

One of the most glorified martyrs of Orthodoxy in the 20th century St. Maxim (Sandovich) serves as a reminder that true belief has a price. He was born to pious parents in Galicia in the Horlitsky district in the village of Zdyna. Having finished primary school and four years of study at the gymnasium, he entered the Pocheav Lavra in Russia as a novice. After several years at the monastery, he entered the seminary in Zhitomir. After completing his studies, he married a young Orthodox woman, Pelagia, and was ordained to the holy priesthood in 1911. He returned to his home-land to serve the growing number of Orthodox faithful who had fled the "Unia" and returned to the Orthodox Church. In less than one year, he was arrested by the Austro-Hungarian militia for his zealous activity among the Orthodox faithful, and taken to prison bound in chains. For two years, he languished in a Lvov prison without trial enduring horrible conditions and abuse. In early 1914, the holy priest was released from prison for lack of evidence, and he returned to his home village.

By the summer of 1914, the Austro-Hungarian authorities were suspicious of any persons involved with the Orthodox Church, especially the Priest Maxim Sandovich. Without warning, the

militia arrested Fr. Maxim, his Matushaka, and his parents, dragging them off in chains to the district prison. Forced to travel by foot the entire way, they suffered much at the hands of their captors. On Sunday, August 6th, just before dawn, the priest rose from his bunk, read his morning prayers and three akathists.



Having finished the third akathist, two soldiers dragged him from the cell and put him before Captain Deitrich, a man known for his cruelty. Saint Maxim stood silently before his accusers. Captain Deitrich read out the execution order and laughed heartily.

He approached the innocent priest, tore off his pectoral cross and letting it fall to the ground, trampled it under his feet. He then marked an "X" on Fr. Maxim's black riassa in the middle of his chest for the firing squad. Two soldiers, standing less than ten feet away, waited for the command. As Captain Deitrich began the customary command of orders to the two soldiers, St. Maxim cried out; "Long live the Rusin People! Long live Orthodoxy!" Shots rang out in the courtyard, and the newest martyr for Christ fell to the ground. One of the soldiers approached the dead priest and shot him three more times in the head with a revolver. His mother and father along with his Matuska wept as they watched the scene before them. The pious Orthodox faithful buried the holy priest under the watchful eye of those who had murdered him. To this day, many travel to his grave asking the holy martyr to intercede for them.

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LIVING ORTHODOXY

WHY DO WE FAST?

From Coffee with Sister Vassa on June 28

“Then the disciples of John came to him, saying, ‘Why do we and the Pharisees fast, but your disciples do not fast?’ And Jesus said to them, ‘Can the wedding guests mourn as long as the bridegroom is with them? The days will come, when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast. And no one puts a piece of unshrunk cloth on an old garment, for the patch tears away from the garment, and a worse tear is made. Neither is new wine put into old wineskins; if it is, the skins burst, and the wine is spilled, and the skins are destroyed; but new wine is put into fresh wineskins, and so both are preserved.’” (Matthew 9:14-17)

Today, on the fifth day of the Apostles’ Fast, we have this reading on fasting. The Lord gives two reasons why the Apostles did not fast, as did John’s disciples and the Pharisees, while He was “with them”: **1.** It was not the appropriate time for them to do so, and **2.** They were not ready for the “new” forms of piety, including a “new” kind of fasting in the Era of the Church, in the “communion of the Holy Spirit”; of the “new” Comforter, Who was to be sent to them on Pentecost.

How is our kind of fasting, in the Era of the Church, “new”? It is closely connected to our

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“new” kind of eating and drinking, which is sanctified and dignified, if you will, by our eating and drinking of the Body and Blood of Christ. We not only fast, but we also feast, as Church, “around,” or focused on, the celebration of the Eucharist. It is the Eucharist that is always the focal point of our celebration of church-feasts, and it (the Eucharist) is always preceded by shorter or longer periods of fasting.

Why is abstinence from, and partaking of, “food” a central part of our “new” life in the Church? Because it is our “bad food-choice” in the garden, when we chose to seek “nourishment” where God did not bless us to, that led to our brokenness (Gen 3). And this continues to be the case with us, that we get broken by seeking “nourishment” in the wrong places, – physically, spiritually, and intellectually. I mean, we might seek it in junk-food, harmful amounts of alcohol, or other drugs; in unhealthy relationships; and in noxious sources of information and entertainment. Through our communal, physical fasting-and-feasting, the Church offers us a useful instrument, which helps guide us also into spiritual fasting-and-feasting, that is, into the proper boundaries of our search for “nourishment.” Because the physical affects the spiritual, and vice-versa, as we learn if we try it.

Glory be to God for our nourishing Tradition.

SPIRITUAL CONSIDERATIONS

Mystery of Confession – Opportunities are available after every service, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

Holy Communion/Eucharist – The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged by all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not Orthodox may receive a *blessing* from the chalice.

Lapsed Members – You are always welcome home and we want you back! Generally speaking, sincere participation in the Mysteries of Confession, Communion, and regular attendance at the divine services are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

Baptisms – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other



a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Father for more details.

Adult Chrismation – New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

Marriages – are solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays. They are not performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Father ASAP for more details (before arrangements are made for the hall).

Church Funerals – are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual and financial obligations; otherwise burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

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“The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times. The body of a Christian has been sanctified with the Grace of the Holy Spirit, and as such may not be burned. God did not create our bodies for burning.” - Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica

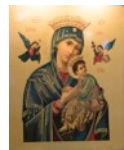
