



The Holy Martyr Pancharios (April 1 / March 19) The Holy Martyr Pancharios was an official of the emperor Maximian (305-311). He abandoned Christianity and became a pagan. His mother

and sister in learning of this sent him a letter, in which they urged the apostate to heed the fear of

God and the impending dread Last Judgement. Having repented himself, Saint Pancharios openly confessed his faith before the emperor Maximian, for which he suffered torture at Rome, and then was dispatched to Nicomedia and there beheaded (+ c. 302).

SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: Philippians 4:4-9

⁴Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. 6 Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

⁸ Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. ⁹ What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do; and the God of peace will be with you.

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Gospel: John 12:1-18 **Mary Anoints Jesus**

12 Six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Laz'arus was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. 2 There they made him a supper; Martha served, and Laz'arus was one of those at table with him. ³ Mary took a pound of costly ointment of pure nard and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the ointment. ⁴ But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (he who was to betray him), said, 5 "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii [a day's wage] and given to the poor?" 6 This he said, not that he cared for the poor but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box he

used to take what was put into it. ⁷ Jesus said, "Let her alone, let her keep it for the day of my burial. 8 The poor you always have with you, but you do not always have me."

The Plot to Kill Lazarus

⁹ When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came, not only on account of Jesus but also to see Laz'arus, whom he had raised from the dead. ¹⁰ So the chief priests planned to put Laz'arus also to death, ¹¹ because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus.

Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem

¹² The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. ¹³ So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" ¹⁴ And Jesus found a young ass and sat upon it; as it is written, ¹⁵ "Fear not, daughter of Zion;


behold, your king is coming,

sitting on an ass's colt!"

¹⁶ His disciples did not understand this at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that this had been written of him and had been done to him. ¹⁷ The crowd that had been with him when he called Laz'arus out of the tomb and raised him from the dead bore witness. 18 The reason why the crowd went to meet him was that they heard he had done this sign.

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Participating in Holy Week: Great And Holy Week Services Explained

Here is a brief look at the services of Passion Week:

Day: Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday Nights **Service: Bridegroom Matins** (not currently offered at our Parish)

Something About The Service: In Scripture we hear the Lord's parable of the 10 wise virgins, 5 of whom prepared their lamps with oil, waiting for the Bridegroom to come for the wedding feast and 5 were not prepared and were not allowed in. No one knew when the Bridegroom would arrive so they had to be prepared and watchful. Christ as our Bridegroom marries humanity with divinity through coming to the cross and rising from the dead bringing us back to Paradise. We honor his Passion and love for us in these services that call Him the Bridegroom.

What To Look Or Listen For: Listen for the special Troparion sung about Christ the Bridegroom coming at Midnight and LOOK for the procession of the icon of Christ in Extreme Humility set out this evening. Each Scripture Reading on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday have a special parable or example from the Old and New Testament that helps us think about preparing for God's resurrection with love.

Something Special About This Day: Behold, the bridegroom comes in the middle of the night and blessed is the servant whom he shall find watching, and unworthy the servant whom he shall find heedless. Take care then, O my soul, and be not weighed down by sleep that you will not be given over unto death and be excluded from the Kingdom. But rise up and call out: Holy, Holy, Holy are You O God, by the Theotokos have mercy on us! (Troparion of the First Three Days)

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Day: Wednesday Night

Service: Mystery of Holy Unction (Anointing)

Something About The Service: Just as Christ's feet were anointed by the sinful woman

who was a harlot, preparing Him for His death (as the dead were anointed) we too are invited to be anointed. In this healing service of 7 gospels and 7 epistles we hear of Christ's healing and forgiveness.

What To Look Or Listen For: Listen to the 7 Epistles and 7 Gospels about the healing acts of Christ. LOOK as the Gospel is held over the Faithful instead of the hand of the priest as a sign of God's Holy Word blessing us.

Something Special About This Day: Oil has been used for religious purposes in both the Old and New Testaments. Aaron was anointed to be set apart as a king along with David and in the New Testament the good Samaritan bound the wounds of the beggar with oil and wine. It has healing affects and in this service the oil is blessed and faithful are anointed for the healing of BODY and SOUL and the forgiveness of sins. Holy Unction prepares us just as Christ was prepared and anointed with oil by the women days before His death and burial, in this way we walk with Christ and join in the preparation for our own death to sin and life in Christ.

Day: Thursday Morning

Service: Vesperal Divine Liturgy of St Basil the Great

Something About The Service: We meet Jesus in the upper room and celebrate the moment He initiated the Mystery of the Eucharist offering

bread and wine to become His Body and Blood for the first time as He communed with His Disciples. *Take and Eat... Drink of this...*

What To Look Or Listen For: On this day the priest sets aside small pieces of Holy Communion to replace the older ones in the tabernacle on the altar. These are used when visiting members in the hospital or at home. The Body and Blood of Christ is always upon the altar and is renewed every Holy Thursday.

Something Special About This Day: Today we celebrate Christ bringing His Apostles together for a final meal before His betrayal. The Gospel of John in chapter 17 we read the High Priestly Prayer, a prayer offered by Christ to His Father that speaks of His desire that we love each other and are one together as Christ is one with His Father. Christ commands His Apostles to offer the Eucharist with Bread and Wine that will become His Body and Blood for the remission of sins. This is the initial institution of the Holy Eucharist.

Day: Thursday Night

Service: Matins with the 12 Gospels

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Something About The Service: We read every account of Christ's passion and death on

the cross which was on a Friday. Each day of Holy Week is celebrated a day early because we anticipate with joy the Lord's coming.

What To Look Or Listen For: Listen to the 12 Gospel Readings about the betrayal, Trial, Crucifixion and Death of Christ. LOOK for Christ upon a cross brought out of the altar in this service.

Something Special About This Day: lowery wreaths may be placed upon the cross of Christ after He is brought out during a particular hymn. Consider making a wreath with flowers at home to place upon Christ and His cross during this service.

Day: Friday Morning Service: Royal Hours

Something About The Service: We hear the First, Third, Sixth and Ninth Hours read together as one service with the special Old Testament Prophecies, Gospel Accounts and Epistle

Testament Prophecies, Gospel Accounts and Epistle Readings of Christ's death.

What To Look Or Listen For: Listen again of Christ's Passion in the Old Testament readings, letters of St. Paul, and the Gospel readings that relate to His suffering.

Something Special About This Day: Holy Friday or Good Friday should be a most sacred day in every home. Leaving the TV off along with other electronics and spending the day with reverence in our strict fasting (from food and our passions). The Church is open today with services. Find yourself by the cross.

Day: Friday Night

Service: Vespers with the Procession of the Holy Shroud

Something About The Service: The last sad moment of Great Lent: Friday night after

Christ is taken down from the cross, we place Him in the tomb after the burial shroud procession outside. This is a service to God not to be missed.

What To Look Or Listen For: Jesus is taken off the cross when we first read about Joseph of Arimathea in the Gospel. The burial shroud of Christ is carried over the priest and around the church.

Something Special About This Day: Before the service begins, a "tomb" is erected in the middle of the

church building and is decorated with flowers. Also a special icon which is painted on cloth (in Greek, epitaphios; in Slavonic, plaschanitsa) depicting the dead Saviour is placed on the altar table and made ready for Church. It is sprinkled with rose water or holy water today just as Joseph anointed Jesus' body.

> + + + Day: Saturday Morning

Service: Vesperal Divine Liturgy of St **Basil the Great (First Resurrection)**

Something About The Service: This morning is filled with JOY! We hear many readings of Old Testament accounts that foreshadowed Christ's rising form the dead like with Jonah and the Whale. Black vestments are changed to white and rose petals and bay leaves can be tossed showing the joy over Christ bringing His Light and Life to those in the tombs!

What To Look Or Listen For: How many resurrection stories can you find in the many readings offered today? Consider how Jonah was in the belly of a whale for three days and lived. LOOK at the change in the clergy vestments in celebration of Christ bringing Life to those in the tombs!

Something Special About This Day: Christ is keeping the Saturday Sabbath of rest by laying in the Tomb dead, but really asleep, as we know He will rise on the new day. Sunday, the unending Day as the first born of the dead! Just as God rested on the 7th day in Genesis after His creation of all things... Christ rests after His passion as He refashions and redeems fallen man in Himself with His incarnation, baptism, suffering, death and ultimate resurrection allowing us to receive Him and His Life anew.

Why Do the Orthodox Sometimes Celebrate Pascha (Easter) on a Different **Day from Roman Catholics?**

It's time for that annual round of ABSOLUTELY WRONG "Why Orthodox Pascha [Easter] doesn't line up with Western Easter every year" articles.

It's very simple. The basic principle is: Pascha happens the first Sunday following the first full moon following the vernal (spring) equinox, which is assumed as the invariant date of March 21. This was established by the First Ecumenical Council, held in Nicaea in AD 325.

The differences arise because: 1. The Orthodox use March 21 on the Julian (Old) Calendar, which differs by some 13 days from the +++ +++ +++ +++ +++ +++ +++ +++ +++ +++ +++

Day: Saturday Night

Service: Resurrection (Paschal) Matins

Something About The Service: Tonight the message of Christ's resurrection is read

outside as it cannot be contained by the walls of the church! We process with candles and are watchful in hymns, wearing white vestments, the doors of the church are knocked on three times, as Christ knocked on the doors of hell that opened by His pure Life and freeing those held captive. CHRIST IS RISEN!!! CHRISTOS VOSKRESE!!!

What To Look Or Listen For: LOOK as the Christ is removed from the tomb and placed upon the altar for 40 days! The holy flame is brought out of the altar and shared with everyone. LISTEN for the knocking on the doors of the church outside and the singing of CHRIST IS RISEN! Also, hear the special sermon of St. John Chrysostom.

Something Special About This Day: A procession outside recalls the original procession of those preparing to be baptized in the early years of the church 2000 years ago. In the darkness of the night with candles we hear the gospel of Christ's empty tomb and resurrection outside for it is too great for walls to hold. The faithful enter the church completely lit with candles and decorated with flowers. Everything is sung with joy as we prepare for the Divine Liturgy on Sunday morning to celebrate Christ's triumph over death!!! Following the service we will gather and bless our Paschal (Easter) Baskets as the Great Fast is over.

The full moon is determined not by observation, but according to tables that say when it is according to the year in a cycle. The Orthodox have a different table than the Roman Catholics (and, consequently, the Western Protestants).

differences have nothing to do with observing Pascha after Passover. The first Nicaean Council explicitly de-linked Pascha from Passover, which, due to Jewish rabbinical decisions could move from year to year. The Council wanted to free the Christian Church from this variability.
