#### ORTHODOX WORD OF THE WEEK



**THEOTOKOS** – Because Jesus Christ is the divine Son of God, Mary is called the Mother of God to profess our faith that in the Incarnation, God

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was in her womb. Elizabeth called Mary "blessed" and "the mother of my Lord" (Luke 1:42-43). At the Council of Ephesus in 431, the Church condemned Nestorius and other heretics who refused to call the Virgin Mary the *Theotokos*. For if it was not God in Mary's womb, there is no salvation for mankind. (See Lk 1:26-43; Jn. 1:1-14)

ТRANSLATING THEOTOKOS: The Church Slavonic translation is Bohoroditsa (Богородица). The full title of Mary in Slavic Orthodox tradition is "Our Most Holy Lady Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary" (Russian Пресвятая Владычица наша Богородица и Приснодева Мария). While some languages used by various Orthodox churches often have a single native word for Theotokos (from Greek, Θεοτόκος), it gets translated into English in a

number of ways: "God-bearer", "Birth-giver of God", and "Mother of God." There are difficulties with all these translations, however. The most popular translation, Mother of God, is accurate to a point, but the difficulty with that one is that Mother of God is the literal translation of another Greek phrase which is found on nearly all icons of the Theotokos: Meter Theou (Μητηρ Θεου), usually in the standard iconographic abbreviation of "MP OY". Additionally, a number of hymns employ both Theotokos and Meter Theou translating both as Mother of God can yield some rather nonsensical language, and it destroys the distinction that the hymnographer intended. The word usage that seems to be dominant in English-speaking Orthodox churches in North America is to adopt the original term itself into English (something English speakers have traditionally done with foreign words almost since the earliest known history of the language), transliterating it simply as Theotokos.

#### The Martyrs Anicetas and Photios

Commemorated on August 25/12

The Martyrs Anicetas and Photios (his nephew) were natives of Nicomedia. Anicetas, a military official, denounced the emperor Diocletian (284-305) for having set

up in the city square an implement of execution for frightening Christians. The enraged emperor ordered Saint Anicetas to be tortured, and later condemned him to be devoured by wild beasts. But the lions they set loose became gentle and fondled up to him. Suddenly there began a strong earthquake, resulting in the collapse of the pagan temple of Hercules, and many pagans perished city beneathe the crumbled walls. executioner took up a sword to cut off the saint's head, but he himself fell down insensible. They tried to break Saint Anicetas on the wheel and burn him with fire, but the wheel stopped and the fire went out. They threw the martyr into a furnace with boiling tin, but the tin got cold. Thus the Lord preserved His servant for the edification of many. The martyr's nephew, Saint Photios, saluted the sufferer and turn to the emperor, remarking: "O idol-worshipper, thine gods – be nothing!" The sword, held over the new confessor, instead struck the executioner himself. Then the martyrs were

thrown into prison. After three days Diocletian began to urge them: "Worship our gods, and I shalt give ye glory and riches". The martyrs answered: "Perish thou with thine honour and riches!" Then they tied them by the legs to wild horses, but the saints, dragged along the ground, remained unharmed. They did not suffer either in the heated up bath-house, which tumbled apart. Finally Diocletian ordered a great furnace to be fired up, and many Christians, inspired by the deeds of Saints Anicetas and Photios, went in themselves with the words: "We are Christians!" They all died with prayer on their lips. The bodies of Saints Anicetas and Photios were not harmed by the fire, and even their hair remained whole. seeing this, many of the pagans came to believe in Christ. This event happened in the year 305.

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# What Does "Intercede" Mean? And Why Do We Need It?

Have you ever tried to help a two year old do something? He usually ends up saying, "I want to do it by myself!"

Sometimes we sound like that, too! We want to do things all by ourselves. We want to do big things, important things, hard things. But we don't want help. We want to do it all by ourselves.

For two weeks in August, we try hard to remember that we have a helper who is looking out for us. The Theotokos, the Mother of God, is our helper. During the special church services, we say again and again, "O Most Holy Theotokos, intercede for us" or "Pray for us." We want her to ask her Son to help us.

This week, on the 28<sup>th</sup>, we remember how Mary, the Theotokos, died and went to heaven. She is so close to her Son there! She has a special relationship with Him, and He listens especially to her. When she asks Him for something, He listens. So, when she "intercedes," she tries to persuade Him to do

something for us.

Let's not be like a two year old! It's better to ask for help, especially when it is from the holy Theotokos!

# Reverence In Church: God's House Must Be Entered With Awe And Fear

We must practice reverence in the temple, whether during services or when we step into the church to light a candle and venerate the holy icons. The temple is the place set apart for the worship of the Holy Trinity and is the place where the Bloodless Sacrifice is offered before the Throne of God.

It is in the temple that we receive the Body and Blood of our Saviour unto remission of sins and

unto life everlasting. It is the holy place where we are cleansed of our sins through the threefold

immersion of baptism, becoming members of One Body, the Church.

The temple is the place where we seek to be reconciled with God through the Mystery of Penance [Holy Confession] and enter into the life of the Spirit. The temple is God's house and must be entered with

awe and the fear of God.

remembrance is a joyful holiday and worldwide festival... For at present she is the only one who has a place in heaven with her divinely glorified body in the company of her Son.'

Orthodoxy venerates the Theotokos through its icons, hymns and feasts and prays for her intercessions to her Son and our God...

Like Pascha... The Dormition shows us that through our faith and good works and Christ's love and mercy, we can attain immortal life.

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### HYMN TO THE MOST HOLY THEOTOKOS

You are truly deserving of glory, O Birth-giver of God, the ever-blessed and most pure Mother of our God. More honorable than the Cherubim and beyond compare more glorious than the Seraphim, who as a Virgin gave birth to God the Word, true Birth-giver of God, we magnify you.
