Remember, the invitation to the priest to come and bless your home is an invitation to ask for the mercy of God upon the household. The sprinkling of the Holy Water is a sign of God's presence in the home as an extension of His Holy House, the Church. It is a time to renew our commitment to God as we begin another year in His mercy.

Holy Water Reminders: Do Not Hoard It!

While Holy Water does not "go bad", it is best to refresh your water each year. Holy Water from the previous Theophany should be poured outside (preferably on the corner of your house or in a garden where people are not going to walk on it). The best scenario though is to use your Holy Water: take a drink in the mornings, use in your cooking, etc.

✓ Call/Text (412-748-0148) or Email (fr.sleepless@gmail.com) Fr. Dave today with your preferred windows of time.

✓ Have a <u>white</u> cloth placed on the table, an <u>icon</u> and/or a <u>cross</u>, and a <u>candle</u> to be lit.

✓ Have a <u>list of names</u> of all those who <u>live</u> in the home (*including your pets*) and a list of the <u>departed</u> members of your family and friends you would wish to have remembered during the service.

✓ (I will provide the Holy Water for the blessing.)
 ✓ Have all TVs, radios, and cell phones turned off.
 ✓ If you have anything to be blessed

(*Icon, Cross, etc.*), have it on the table.
✓ Participation is important! Have <u>everyone</u> gather

around the table and join in the blessing.

✓ Feel free to invite neighbors and friends over to be a part of this beautiful tradition!

✓ If you need to discuss a personal matter, this is a good time to do so!

#1 - Thank God For Our Blessings #2 - BE PRESENT

If each day is a gift, then we need to "show up" for that gift. That means not living in the past or worrying about the future. It means living our life and not following how everyone else is living theirs.

Why Do Orthodox Christians **Have their Homes Blessed?**

The Great Blessing of Water and the Home

The Great Blessing of Water takes place at the end of that day's Liturgy. Since our homes cannot be brought to the Church, the Church - through the priest and cantor - go to the homes. There the service of blessing, which began in the church, is finished with the sprinkling of water in the home. Traditionally, in most Orthodox parishes, the priest personally visits all his parishioners each year to pray with them in the place where they live, and to bless their surroundings with the newly sanctified water of Theophany (January 6/13). By sanctifying our living quarters, our private place, we extend the grace of God to our individual dwellings. (In very large parishes a yearly visit may not be possible. In areas of the country where the winter is harsh, I know of at least one parish where houses are blessed at the beginning of the ecclesiastical year in September.)

We also bring the blessed water to our homes to use throughout the year to bless our homes and to drink whether we are ill or as part of our daily prayer life. "There are many occasions in family life when a sip of holy water can help to remind us of the blessing that was given 'to bestow sanctification', 'unto healing of soul and body', 'to be a fountain welling forth unto life



eternal', as the priest prayed in the litany of Epiphany day." (Little Falcons: Water, Vol. 5, No. 2, 1998, p.33.)

Weaving Christ into Our Lives

The blessing of homes by these holy maintains waters the spiritual association between the 'family church' and the parish, as well as again

providing for the sharing of God's spiritual gifts. ... This annual blessing is not as elaborate as the blessing of the new dwelling, but because of this it should not be overlooked, for it is in this way that the grace of God is extended to individual dwellings." (Marriage and the Christian Home, p.25.)

If the priest comes to bless the home when the children are present, they have the opportunity to see the parish priest in a different and personal situation. If the priest permits, they can lead the way through the house, or hold a candle. They can show him their rooms or pets or favorite toys. They receive a blessing with water. For children, the house blessing shows the connection of the Church to the home.

In Summary

What does it mean to ask God to bless something? All things in the world have been spoiled right along with us. God must bless His world again in order for it to be the way that He wants it to be. For this reason God sent His Son Jesus and the Holy Spirit to the world: to bless everyone and everything that He made, to make all things good again. When the priest comes to bless our homes, he asks God to have mercy on the house, to rid it of every evil and to fill it with every blessing. What a wonderful way to begin the New Year!


The Holy Martyrs Ermil and Stratonik

Commemorated on January 26 / 13

The Holy Martyrs Ermil and Stratonik, by origin Slavs, lived at the beginning of the IV Century during the time of persecution against Christians

by the emperor Licinius (307-324). They were friends. Saint Ermil served

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but he remained unyielding. Saint Stratonik was



a superintendent of the prison and a secret christian. Seeing the agonising torments of his friend, he was not able to keep from weeping, and he revealed that he was a christian. They subjected him also to torture. After the torturing, they put the martyrs into a net and threw them into the Danube/Dunai. On the third day, the bodies of the saints were discovered on the bank of the river by christians and buried near Singedonum. Their venerable heads are located in the Church of Saint Sophia, where the Russian pilgrim Antonii saw them in the year 1200.

A Prayer To End Abortion

O Lord, Jesus Christ, Who did shed Your precious blood upon the Cross for the salvation of all mankind: receive the souls of all the innocent pre-born babies, who have been, are being, or will be slaughtered today in the hospitals and abortion chambers throughout our nation and the world. And as their untimely deaths have prevented them from receiving the grace of Holy Baptism, I entreat You to accept their innocent blood as their Baptism (as You did with the early Martyrs); so that they can share eternity with You.

To the doctors, nurses, parents, and hosts of accomplices responsible for this infanticide, grant tears of repentance; so that they can run to You for forgiveness and healing. and thus avoid the eternal death of their souls.

I believe that all things are possible with You, O Lord.

Therefore, I entreat You on this day, through Your divine Grace, to convince at least one mother in every state to cancel her abortion and bring her child to full term; and to convince one doctor in every state to repent of his actions, and never again kill a child in the womb.
