

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LIVES OF THE SAINTS

The "Falling-Asleep" or "Repose" ("Dormition", "Uspenie", "Koimesis") of our Most-Holy Lady Theotokos (Mother of God) and Ever-Virgin Mary

Commemorated August 28/15

The feast of the Dormition is the last great feast in the Church calendar year. It is preceded by a two-week fast.

The glorious lot of the ever-blessed Virgin in the work of God's salvation of the world made all Her life wonderful and exemplary. After the Crucifixion of Christ, the Mother of God was taken to live in the house of Her adopted son, the Apostle John. Tradition notes than even after the descent of the Holy Spirit on the apostles, the Mother of God remained in Jerusalem, visiting those places where the Saviour of the world preached, suffered and died. She did not want to leave the country that was dear and holy to Her. When king Herod Agrippa began to persecute the Church, both the pagans and the Jews, indignant of the respect that the Mother of God was receiving from the Christians, wanted to kill Her. It was during this time that She traveled with Apostle John to Ephesus. Church tradition has this also as the time of Her visit to Cyprus to Bishop Lazarus, who had been raised from the dead after four days, and to Mount Athos. When the persecution ended, the Mother of God returned to Apostle John's house at Zion in Jerusalem.

Once, when She went to the Mount of Olives to pray, Archangel Gabriel appeared and spoke of Her approaching departure from this world. Upon returning home, She told Apostle John all that the Archangel had said to Her and started preparing Herself for Her final day on earth. Friends and relatives gathered, and eleven of the apostles were miraculously transported from various parts of the world to Her deathbed. They were all amazed to see each other there. When Apostle John explained that the Mother of God would soon be departing this world, they understood why God had brought them together and became sad. But She comforted them, saying: "Do not cry and darken My happiness with your sadness. I am going to My Son and your God, and you will bury My body and return each to your work." As the time of Her death

neared, the room shone with a divine light, the roof disappeared, and a wondrous sight appeared before all: the Lord Jesus Christ descended from heaven surrounded by many angels. All looked upon this wondrous sight with awe and reverence, and when they approached Her bed, the holy body of the Mother of God

shone radiantly, and a fragrance of incense pervaded the room.

Dormition of the Theotokos

The apostles carried the body of the Mother of God through the city to Gethsemane, to be buried at Her request in the tomb of Her family and Joseph. They buried Her body, closed the tomb with a stone and remained there at the site in prayer for three days. On the third day Apostle Thomas arrived and was very saddened that he did not find the Mother of God alive. To make him feel better, the other apostles rolled away the stone to let him pay his respects to the body. But on entering the tomb, they found that the body was not there – only the winding sheet. They returned home to partake of a communal meal at which they always left a place for the Resurrected Lord. After the meal, they raised the bread left for Christ aloft and exclaimed: "Lord, Jesus Christ, help us." And they heard a choir of angels, and when they looked up they saw the Holy Virgin surrounded by angels. She greeted them, saying: "Rejoice, for I am with you through all the days." Then the apostles were filled with joy, and instead of using the usual words, they exclaimed: "Most holy Mother of God, help us." And now they understood and believed that upon the third day after Her dormition, the Mother of God had been resurrected.

Thus, the dormition of the Mother of God is not a sad event, but a joyous one. Her death is but a short sleep, after which follows Her resurrection and ascension to heaven. From the very beginning, the Church saw in the Mother of God the One who would pray for all of mankind. She is the haven of all the mothers in the world. She teaches us how to live in total faithfulness to the will of God. She, who kept in Her heart the divine words, is an example of faithfulness, love and service.

The Holy Martyr Myron

Commemorated on August 30/17

The Holy Martyr Myron was a presbyter in Achaeia (Greece), and lived during the III Century. He suffered in the year 250 under the emperor Decius (249-251). The presbyter was gentle and kind to people, but he was also courageous in the defense of his spiritual children. One time, on the feast of the Nativity of Christ, he was celebrating Divine-services. The local governor Antipater came into the church with soldiers so as to arrest those praying there and to subject them to torture. Seeing this, Saint Myron began heatedly to plead for his flock, denouncing the governor for his cruelty. The saint was delivered over to torture, – they took him and struck at his body with iron rods. They then threw the presbyter into a red-hot

oven, but the Lord preserved the martyr – at the very moment when about 150 men at a nearby pagan temple were scorched by the oven fire. The governor then began to demand the martyr to worship idols. Having received from Saint Myron a firm refusal, Antipater ordered the leather thongs to be cut from his skin. Saint Myron took one of the leather thongs and threw it in the face of his tormentor. Falling into a rage, Antipater gave orders to strike Saint Myron all over his stripped body, and then to deliver the martyr over to wild beasts for devouring. But the beasts would not touch him. Perceiving himself defeated, Antipater in his blind rage committed suicide. They then took Saint Myron to the city of Kizika, where he was beheaded by the sword (+ 250).

LIVING ORTHODOXY

Ascent to the Celestial Realm of the Most Pure One

"The Angels, as they looked upon the Dormition of the Virgin, were struck with wonder, seeing how the Virgin went up from earth to heaven."

"It is the Day of Resurrection, let us be radiant, O ye people; for Christ is risen, O gladness eternal."

We exclaim so joyfully on the days of the Feast of the Feasts, on the days of the Pascha of Christ. And now, on this day of Our Lady's Pascha, the day of the Dormition of the Most Pure One, we sing a triumphant song: "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?"

These two bright holidays have one theme and one essence. The theme is the victory over death, the calling of man to eternity.

Thus, in the Pascha of Christ, the Master of Life, Jesus Christ, conquers death on the Cross, when He rises on the third day; here, in the Assumption, in the Pascha of the Mother of God, Jesus Christ, who lifted up our flesh to the Abode of the Father on the fortieth day, prevented the corruption of the body of the Most Pure Virgin, resurrected it from the tomb on the third day. **Once again, death is conquered**. The One of our kind is not subject to judgment or decay, but is taken with the flesh to the same Abode.

Isn't that why the Dormition Fast is so similar to Great Lent? The same essence of holidays, the same preparation is required from believers: abstinence, prayer, and purification. Remember: "our struggle is against spiritual wickedness in high places," and "this kind goes not out but by prayer and fasting."

Whereas the Pascha of the Lord is preceded by Holy Week, the Pascha of the Theotokos (Mother of God) – the feast of Dormition – is preceded by the Day of the Cross: the Life-Giving Cross marks the beginning of the Dormition Fast, blessing us for the feats of fasting, abstinence, and cleansing of sins, before we can

Blessing of Flowers and Fragrant Herbs on Dormition

Holy Tradition tells us that all the Apostles, with the exception of St. Thomas, were transported mystically to Jerusalem in order to be with the Mother of God – the Theotokos – as she reposed, and to be present at her burial. When the Apostle Thomas arrived the next day, the Apostles opened the tomb so that he could kiss her farewell. As the tomb was opened, the body of the Most Pure Virgin was missing, and the cave was filled with flowers and the sweet fragrance of Paradise. This was a sure sign of her great purity and holiness to the faithful.

finally bow to the Dormition of the Pure One and Her ascent to the celestial realm. "The Angels, as they looked upon the Dormition of the Virgin, were struck with wonder, seeing how the Virgin went up from earth to heaven."

The Cross of the Lord is erected in the middle of Great Lent to maintain spiritual strength, and is placed in the middle of the temple so that believers can draw strength and joy in the contemplation of the Light of Love in the Lord's feat of the Cross.

The Radiant Feast of Transfiguration is a beacon standing in the middle of the Dormition Fast. It calls the believers to the feat of climbing the rocky and thorny path in the fight against evil, sin, and corruption.

Who is a madman to ask now: why should we abstain from our passions? What kind of madman, in the light of Transfiguration, would dare to stop halfway through his ascent to the Light of Christ, to the Goal of our life – to His abode, seeing Christ on Mount Tabor, hearing His conversation with Elijah and Moses, confirming the reality of eternal life, and hearing the voice of the Father: "This is My beloved Son: listen to Him".

O Man who is called to royal eternity, you are now a traveler who has lost his way. Raise your eyes upward. Bow to the Cross, on which the Love of God is crucified; climb the mountain of transformation of your flesh, embrace the voice of angels praising the bodily ascent of the Most Pure One to heaven. With all power of persuasion, you will exclaim: "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."

The gates of the Jerusalem on High, the gates of the House of the Heavenly Father, are now open to all who have been baptized in Christ and who have put on Christ. Amen.

The herbs, used as natural medicine, are blessed in commemoration of the numerous healings and the extraordinary grace bestowed on the pilgrims at the blessed tomb of the Mother of God. During times of family strife or illness, it is a pious custom to place the flower petals in the house censer, together with the incense, and cense the whole house with it.
