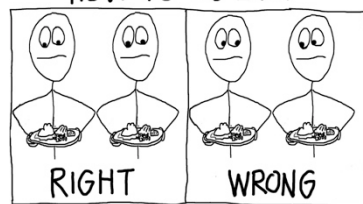

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SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: *Hebrews 11:24-26, 11:32-12:2*

²⁴By faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, ²⁵choosing rather to share ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. ²⁶He considered abuse suffered for the Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he looked to the reward.

³²And what more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets— ³³who through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, received promises, stopped the mouths of lions, ³⁴quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. ³⁵Women received their dead by resurrection. Some were tortured, refusing to accept release, that they might rise again to a better life. ³⁶Others suffered mocking and scourging, and even chains and imprisonment. ³⁷They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were killed with the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, ill-treated— ³⁸of whom the world was not worthy— wandering over deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth.

³⁹And all these, though well attested by their faith, did not receive what was promised, ⁴⁰since God had foreseen something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect.

The Example of Jesus

12 Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely,

and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, ² looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

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Gospel: *John 1:43-51*

Jesus Calls Philip and Nathanael

⁴³ The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And he found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." ⁴⁴ Now Philip was from Beth-sa'ida, the city of Andrew and Peter. ⁴⁵ Philip found Nathanael, and said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." ⁴⁶ Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." ⁴⁷ Jesus saw Nathanael coming to him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!" ⁴⁸ Nathanael said to him, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." ⁴⁹ Nathanael answered him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" ⁵⁰ Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, I saw you under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these." ⁵¹ And he said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man."

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"Sometimes people call prayer that which is not prayer at all; for instance: a man goes to church, stands there for a time, looks at the icons or at other people, their faces and dress, and says that he has prayed to God; or else he stands before an icon at home, bows his head, says some words he has learnt by heart, without understanding and without feeling, and says that he has prayed, although with his thoughts and heart he has not prayed at all, but was elsewhere with other people and things, and not with God."

LIVES OF THE SAINTS

Saint Theophylaktos

Commemorated on March 21/8

Saint Theophylaktos lived at Constantinople in the VIII Century during the time of the Iconoclast heresy. After the death of the iconoclast emperor Leo IV the Khazar (775-780), there entered upon the throne the emperor Constantine VI (780-797). There occurred also a change of Patriarchs: the holy Patriarch Paul (Comm. 30 August), not having the strength to continue guiding the flock afront the powerfully spread iconoclasm, voluntarily resigned the cathedra/chair (784). In his place was chosen Saint Tarasios (Comm. 25 February) – at that time an eminent imperial counselor. Under the supervision of the new Patriarch was convened the Seventh OEcumenical Council (787), condemning the Iconoclast heresy. For Orthodoxy a relatively peaceful time began. Monasteries again began to fill with residents.

Saint Theophylaktos, a gifted student of Saint Tarasios and with the blessing of this the Patriarch, settled together with Saint Michael (Comm. 23 May) in a monastery on the coast of the Black Sea. The zealous ascetics by their God-pleasing labours and intense efforts of prayer were granted by God the gift of wonderworking. By their prayers, during the time of an intense drought when the workers in the field were weakened by thirst, an empty vessel became filled with so much water, that it sufficed for the entire day.

After several years in the monastery they were both consecrated by Patriarch Tarasios to the dignity of bishop: Saint Michael was made bishop of Synada, and Saint Theophylaktos was made bishop of Nicomedia.

Heading the Church of Nicomedia, Saint Theophylaktos constantly concerned himself about the flock entrusted to him. He built churches, hospices, homes for wanderers, he generously distributed alms, was guardian for orphans, widows and the sick, and himself

attended to those afflicted with leprosy, not hesitating to wash their wounds.

When the iconoclast Leo the Armenian (813-820) came upon the imperial throne, the terrible heresy burst forth with new strength.

But the iconoclast emperor was not able to sway the successor of the holy Patriarch Tarasios – Saint Nicephoros (806-815, Comm. 2 June), who together with the bishops vainly urged the ruler not to destroy churchly peace. Present at the negotiations of the emperor with the Patriarch was Saint Theophylaktos, denouncing the heretics, and he predicted a speedy perishing to Leo the Armenian. For his bold prophesy the saint was sent into exile to the fortress Strobil (in Asia Minor). He languished for thirty years until his end, which occurred in about the year 845.

After the restoration of icon-veneration in the year 847, under the empress Saint Theodora (842-855; + 867, Comm. 11 February) and her son Michael, the holy relics of Bishop Theophylaktos were transferred back to Nicomedia.

Image and Likeness

Then God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness; let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds

of the air, and over the cattle, over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." —GENESIS 1:26

On the Sunday of Orthodoxy, we celebrate the restoration of the Holy Icons. From Matins we hear: "O people of God, come and let us celebrate a day of joy; the heaven now makes glad, and earth with all the hosts of angels and the companies of mortal men, each in their different orders, keeps the feast."

The week before the Sunday of Orthodoxy, we hear in the Gospel these words from the parable of the Last Judgment: "Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me" (Mt 25:40). By feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, taking in strangers, clothing the naked, visiting those in prison—we are SERVING CHRIST BY SERVING OTHERS.

But, most importantly, on the Sunday of Orthodoxy we celebrate and confirm that we are all icons of God. We, created in the image and likeness of God, serve each other with love as Christ Himself loved each of us. Let us not relegate our understanding of icons to only the images in our homes and churches, but to our living and breathing neighbors.

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TOGETHER: We are all in this together

As we struggle in this life, it is good to remember that we are all together. We find our place of silence, where we encounter God, but even in this place set apart, we are together. In our journey to God, our common goal is the acquisition of a humble and contrite heart, and our common homeland is found in the Divine Liturgy, wherein we enter Paradise, and participate in the Heavenly Banquet, together.

In our moments of loneliness, and despondency, we are together. We are together in our celebration of life, and even in our death. When we seem so alone, we are together, for in Christ we are One Body. Glory to God for His loving kindness. Glory to Him forever.

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Orthodox Holy Tradition is very much like icons. Its Subject is God Himself. Its Predicate is the Word of God. Its Copula, its Living Presence, is the Holy Spirit. It cannot be contained as a historic artifact. It cannot be treated as a museum. Everything in Orthodox religion and spirituality is constantly involving you as the object of inverse perspective. Everything is always actively witnessing to and mediating salvation to you. It is not up to the limitations of our perspective — it is available as an ever-constant witness that is True for everyone, at all times and in all places.

Tradition does not change. But it is always in the process of translation and application. The structure of Church hierarchy has had to accommodate the needs of different times and places. The Church has had to address a wide range of ethical, political, and social concerns throughout the centuries. For a thousand years, the Church was at the forefront of a vast Christian Empire. But in a short time, it became a second-class oppressed people. For a time, it chrismated Tsars who ruled over vast stretches of Eurasia. In just one year, it fell under the murderous yoke of an atheist tyranny.

Still, through all these vicissitudes [*fluctuations*], the Orthodox Testimony of Jesus Christ remained constant. It is a Testimony that is beautiful and peaceful, to be sure, but it is not easy. It is spiritual and material. It is sacramental, iconic, liturgical. It is ascetical and ecstatic. It is kenotic and personalistic.

The lesson of Great Lent, I think, makes it clear that the Triumph of Orthodoxy inheres more in the surrender and sacrifice of ego than in the chanting of anathemas.

That Tradition of the Beautiful Testimony is a Living Tradition. It is not just a treasury of proof-texts and footnotes. It is brought to bear upon every situation “at all times and places” by being translated in every language, and finding the best most effective presentation for every society.

In all these, we are remaining true to the

Triumph of Orthodoxy. Tradition is not a fossil. It is very, very much alive.

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SUGGESTED GUIDELINES FOR THE GREAT FAST (GREAT LENT):

We are called to increase our *Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving* during this time...

PRAYER:

- ✧ *Attend as many of the services as possible and be strengthened in community prayer.*
- ✧ *Come to the Mystery of Confession (offered after every service and on most Saturdays during Great Lent).*
- ✧ *Approach the Chalice to receive the Holy Eucharist as often as possible.*
- ✧ *Also, add additional prayers to your personal Prayer Rule at home.*

FASTING:

- ✧ *The Great Fast begins tomorrow, March 15. This is a day of strict fasting (no meat or dairy products). Likewise, strict fast on Great & Holy Friday (4/30) and Great & Holy Saturday (5/1)*
- ✧ *The tradition of the Orthodox Church is a strict fast (no meat or dairy products eaten) by all of the faithful for the entire 40 days of the Great Fast and for all of Holy Week.*
- ✧ *If you cannot physically do this, adopt a fasting rule and stick to it for the duration of the Great Fast (see Father for some guidance). Here are a few examples:*
 - *a) strict fast on certain days of the week while keeping a meat fast on the others;*
 - *b) fast only from meat;*
 - *c) fast from meat for certain weeks (Clean Week, Cross Week, and Holy Week); or*
 - *d) fast from meat on Wednesdays, Fridays, and all of Holy Week (April 12-18).*
- ✧ *The more effort you put forth in your fasting, the more spiritually uplifting your Lenten Season will be!*
- ✧ *A minimum three (3) hour fast from all food and drink for those receiving Communion at the evening Pre-sanctified Liturgy (the regular “midnight Fast” is called for the Liturgies of St. John Chrysostom & St. Basil the Great)*

✧ *The sick and infirm are not bound by the fast at any time.*

✧ *Those requiring medications or certain prescribed diets are to follow their physician’s instructions.*

✧ *Lastly, the Great Fast is not a “40 day diet program” or simply a “dietary adjustment” (or “label Lent”).*

ALMSGIVING:

✧ *Find a way to give more of your time, talent, and treasures.*

*A general guideline is this:
try do to more than last year.
Let’s talk about different ideas that you have.*

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“It is well to place candles before the icons. But it is still better if you bring as a sacrifice to God the fire of your love for Him [*God*] and your neighbor. It is well that the one should be accompanied by the other.”

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ORTHODOX ETIQUETTE

Postures In Worship: BOWING

During services, a **bow** is often made by the inclining of the head and neck (also called a *reverence*). It is more than a mere nod of the head, but bending at the waist.

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Orthodox Christians **bow** when the names of the Theotokos and Christ are invoked. They also **bow** to the priest at his blessing, and when he asks forgiveness before the Great Entrance and, in some parishes before Holy Communion. It is traditional for the Orthodox faithful to **bow** and cross themselves when they enter and leave the church, and when they pray before the icons.

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It is not necessary to cross oneself when the priest is giving a blessing or censing the congregation. Instead, one should **bow** to receive the blessing. (It is not necessary to turn to “follow the priest” as he censes the church.)

But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. + [Prostration]
Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

*The following triplet is recited 4 times
(making a total of 12 bows):*

O God, be merciful to me, a sinner. [bow]
O God, cleanse me of my sins and have mercy on me. [bow]
O Lord, forgive me, for my sins are many. [bow]

Then the prayer again with only 1 prostration:
O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]



A Prayer Of Repentance (Psalm 50/51)

Have mercy upon me, O God, according to Your great mercy; And according to the multitude of Your compassions, blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, And cleanse me from my sin. For I acknowledge my iniquity, And my sin is continually before me. Against You only have I sinned, And done this evil before You. That You might be justified in Your words, And prevail when You judge. For behold, I was conceived in iniquities, And in sins did my mother bear me.

For behold, You have loved truth; The hidden and secret things of Your wisdom You have made clear to me. You shall sprinkle me with hyssop, and I shall be made clean; You shall wash me and I shall be made whiter than snow. You shall make me to hear joy and gladness, The bones which have been humbled shall rejoice. Turn Your face away from my sins, And blot out all my iniquities.

Create a clean heart in me, O God, And renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Your presence, And take not Your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of Your salvation, And with Your governing Spirit establish me. I shall teach transgressors Your ways, And the ungodly shall turn back to You. Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, who are the God of my salvation, My tongue shall rejoice in Your righteousness. O Lord, You shall open my lips, And my mouth shall declare Your praise.

For if You had desired sacrifice, I would have given it; With whole burnt offerings You shall not be pleased. A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit, A heart that is broken and humbled God will not despise. Do good, O Lord, in Your good pleasure to Zion; And let the walls of Jerusalem be built Then shall You be pleased with a sacrifice of righteousness, with oblation and whole burnt offerings; Then shall they offer bullocks upon Your altar.
