SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: 1 Corinthians 9:2-12

² If to others I am not an apostle, at least I am to you; for you are the seal of my apostleship in the Lord.

³ This is my defense to those who would examine me. ⁴ Do we not have the right to our food and drink? ⁵ Do we not have the right to be accompanied by a wife, as the other apostles and the brothers of the Lord and Cephas? ⁶ Or is it only Barnabas and I who have no right to refrain from working for a living? ⁷ Who serves as a soldier at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard without eating any of its fruit? Who tends a flock without getting some of the milk?

⁸ Do I say this on human authority? Does not the law say the same? ⁹ For it is written in the law of Moses, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it is treading out the grain." Is it for oxen that God is concerned? ¹⁰ Does he not speak entirely for our sake? It was written for our sake, because the plowman should plow in hope and the thresher thresh in hope of a share in the crop. ¹¹ If we have sown spiritual good among you, is it too much if we reap your material benefits? ¹² If others share this rightful claim upon you, do not we still more? Nevertheless, we have not made use of this right, but we endure anything rather than put an obstacle in the way of the gospel of Christ.

The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant

²³ "Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. ²⁴ When he began the reckoning, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents; ²⁵ and as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. ²⁶ So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷ And out of pity for him the lord of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸ But that same servant, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by

the throat he said. 'Pay what you owe.' 29 So his fellow servant fell down and besought him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' 30 He refused and went and put him in prison till he should pay the debt. ³¹ When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. 32 Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you besought me; 33 and should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?³⁴ And in anger his lord delivered him to the jailers, till he should pay all his debt. 35 So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

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LIVES OF THE SAINTS

THE MARTYR LUPPOS

Commemorated on Sept 5/Aug 23

The Martyr Luppos lived at the end of the III Century - beginning II Century, and was a faithful servant of the holy GreatMartyr Demetrios of Soluneia (Thessalonika, Comm. 26 October). Being present at the death of his master, he soaked his own clothing with his blood and took a ring from his hand. With this clothing, and likewise with the ring and the name of the GreatMartyr Demetrios, Saint Luppos worked at Soluneia many miracles. He destroyed pagan idols, for which he was subjected to persecution by the pagans, but by the power of God he was preserved unharmed. Saint Luppos voluntarily delivered himself over into the hands of the torturers and by order of the emperor Maximian Galerius he was beheaded by the sword (+ post 306).

Spiritual Vitamin:

What shall we call you, O Prophet? Angel, Apostle, Martyr? Angel, for you have spent your life like those who have no body. Apostle, for you have taught the nations, and Martyr, for your head has been cut off for the sake of Christ. Pray to Him then that our souls may be granted great mercy!

FEAST DAY FEATURE

The Beheading Of The Prophet, Forerunner Of The Lord, John The Baptist

Commemorated on Sept 11/Aug 29

The Beheading of the Prophet, ForeRunner of the Lord, John the Baptist: The Evangelists Matthew (Mt. 14: 1-12) and Mark (Mk. 6: 14-29) provide accounts about the Martyr's end of John the Baptist in the year 32 after the Birth of Christ.

Following the Baptism of the Lord, Saint John the Baptist was locked up in prison by Herod Antipas. holding one-fourth the rule of the Holy Land as governor of Galilee. (After the death of king Herod the Great, the Romans divided the territory of Palestine into four parts, and into each part put a governor. Herod Antipas received from the emperor Augustus the rule of Galilee). The prophet of God John openly denounced Herod for having left his lawful wife - the daughter of the Arabian king Aretas, and then instead co-habiting with Herodias, - the wife of his brother Philip (Lk. 3: 19-20). On his birthday. Herod made a feast for dignitaries, the elders and a thousand chief citizens. The daughter of Herod, Salome, danced before the guests and charmed Herod. In gratitude to the girl he swore to give her anything, whatsoever she would ask, anything up to half his kingdom. The vile girl on the advice of her wicked mother Herodias asked, that she be given at once the head of John the Baptist on a plate. Herod became apprehensive, for he feared the wrath of God for the murder of a prophet, whom earlier he had heeded. He feared also the people, who loved the holy ForeRunner. But because of the guests and his careless oath, he gave orders to cut off the head of Saint John and to give it to Salome. By tradition, the mouth of the dead head of the preacher of repentance once more opened and proclaimed: "Herod, thou ought not to have the wife of Philip thy brother". Salome took the plate with the head of Saint John and gave it to her mother. The frenzied Herodias repeatedly stabbed the tongue of the prophet with a needle and buried his holy head in a unclean place. But the pious Joanna, wife of Herod's steward Chuza, buried the head of John the Baptist in an earthen vessel on the Mount of Olives. where Herod was possessor of a parcel of land (the

Uncovering of the Venerable Head is celebrated 24 February). The holy body of John the Baptist was taken that night by his disciples and buried at Sebasteia, there where the wicked deed had been done. After the murder of Saint John the Baptist, Herod continued to govern for a certain while. Pontius Pilate, governor of Judea, later sent to him the bound Jesus Christ, over Whom he made mockery (Lk. 23: 7-12).

The judgement of God came upon Herod. Herodias and Salome, even during their earthly life. Salome, crossing the River Sikoris in winter, fell through the ice. The ice gave way for her such that her body was in the water, but her head trapped beneathe the ice. It was similar to how she once had danced with her feet upon the ground, but now flailing helplessly in the icy water. Thus she was trapped until that time when the sharp ice cut through her neck. The corpse was not found, but they brought the head to Herod and Herodias, as once they had brought them the head of Saint John the Baptist. The Arab king Aretas in revenge for the disrespect shown his daughter made war against Herod. Having suffered defeat, Herod suffered the wrath of the Roman emperor Caius Caligua (37-41) and was exiled with Herodias first to Gaul, and then to Spain. And there they were from view.

In memory of the Beheading of Saint John the Baptist, the feastday established by the Church is also a strict day of fast, – as an expression of the grief of Christians at the violent death of the saint. On this day the Church makes remembrance of soldiers, killed on the field of battle, as established in 1769 at the time of a war of Russia with the Turks and the Poles.

Tropar for the Feast of the Beheading of St. John
The remembrance of the Just is worthy of praise, but
the Lord's testimony is sufficient for you, O
Forerunner; for it has shown that you are indeed more
worthy of honor than the Prophets. You were found
worthy to baptize the Lord Who you foretold.
Thereafter you suffered for the truth and rejoicing, also
announced the good news to those in the abyss that
God had appeared as man taking away the sins of the

world and granting to all of us the abundance of mercy.

LIVING ORTHODOXY

The Conclusion of a Feast

The **leavetaking** (Slavonic: otdaniye; Greek: apodosis) of a feast is the final day a feast is celebrated in the Church. In most cases it follows an afterfeast. On the leavetaking, most elements of the festal services are appointed to be served again.

Pascha and most First and Second Class feasts have leavetakings.

- ♣ Pascha—afterfeast: 38 days (leavetaking: Wednesday before Ascension)
- ♣ Ascension—afterfeast: 8 days (leavetaking: Friday before Pentecost)
- Pentecost—afterfeast: 6 days (leavetaking: following Saturday)
- ♣ Nativity of the Theotokos (Sep 21/8)—
 afterfeast: 4 days (leavetaking: Sep 25/12)
- ★ Elevation of the Holy Cross (Sep 27/14)—
 afterfeast: 7 days (leavetaking: Oct 4 / Sep 21)
- ♣ Presentation of the Theotokos (Dec 4 / Nov 21) afterfeast: 4 days (leavetaking: Dec 8 / Nov 25)
- ★ Nativity of Christ (Jan 7 / Dec 25)—afterfeast: 6 days (leavetaking: Jan 13 / Dec 31)
- ▼ Theophany (Jan 19/6)—afterfeast: 8 days (leavetaking: Jan 27/14)
- ♣ Presentation of Christ (Feb 15/2)—afterfeast: 7 days (leavetaking: Feb 22/9)
- ★ Transfiguration (Aug 19/6)—afterfeast: 7 days (leavetaking: Aug 26/13)
- ♣ Dormition (Aug 28/15)—afterfeast: 8 days (leavetaking: Sep 5 / Aug 23)

These Third Class Feasts have leavetakings the day after the Feast Day:

- **St. Demetrios** Nov 8/Oct 26
- Mativity of the Forerunner Jul 7/Jun 24
- **Ss. Peter and Paul** Jul 12/Jun 29
