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SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: 2 Corinthians 6:1-10

6 Working together with him, then, we entreat you not to accept the grace of God in vain. ² For he says,

"At the acceptable time I have listened to you, and helped you on the day of salvation."

Behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation. ³ We put no obstacle in any one's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴ but as servants of God we commend ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵ beatings, imprisonments, tumults, labors, watching, hunger; ⁶ by purity,

knowledge, forbearance, kindness, the Holy Spirit, genuine love, ⁷ truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸ in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹ as unknown, and yet well known; as dying, and behold we live; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰ as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

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Gospel: Luke 5:1-11

Jesus Calls the First Disciples

5 While the people pressed upon him to hear the word of God, he was standing by the lake of Gennes'aret. ² And he saw two boats by the lake; but the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. ³ Getting into one of the boats, which was Simon's, he asked him to put out a little from the land. And he sat down and taught the people from the boat. 4 And when he had ceased speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." ⁵ And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets." ⁶ And when they had done this, they enclosed a great shoal of fish; and as their nets were breaking, they beckoned to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. ⁸But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." ⁹ For he was astonished, and all that were with him, at the catch of fish which they had taken; ¹⁰ and so also were James and John, sons of Zeb'edee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; henceforth you will be catching men." 11 And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him.

"An Orthodox On-Ramp To The Christian Life"
Orthodox Christianity is lived concretely in the rhythms of daily life. Every part of life is included. Following are some specifics, but keep in mind that what a particular Orthodox Christian does is under the guidance of the local pastor and in keeping with the

Each day, an Orthodox Christian should strive to:

▼ say morning and evening prayers

practice of the parish community.

- ₱ pray throughout the day, before meals, before tasks, etc.
- ★ take active care of body, mind, and soul, including sleep, food, exercise, work, & rest.
- ♥ put active effort into relationships, both within the church community and outside.
- read the Bible & the writings of the saints
- watch for and attend to the needs of the world that invite action, whether direct love or prayer, and take time to listen
- ₱ maintain a daily prayer list (family, friends, coworkers, etc.)
- **№** live a moral life

Each week, an Orthodox Christian should strive to:

- worship at the Divine Liturgy (and arrive before the service begins)
- ₩ welcome visitors to the parish, help them follow the worship of the Church, etc
- fast Wednesday & Friday, and Sunday morning.
- worship at the Church at any weekday services, attend the parish Bible Study, and serve at the outreach efforts of the church community.
- ▼ invite parish friends to share in meals, and maintain friendships with them.
- ♣ support the church with your stewardship with financial gifts, volunteer hours, and ongoing prayer.
- ♣ offer assistance to those in the church who need help, whether the elderly, young mothers, or others.


Each <u>year</u>, an Orthodox Christian should strive to:

- ♣ observe the great feasts of the Church. This means both worshipping in the Church, and setting these days apart from the rest of the time
- ★ keep the great fasts of the Church: Great Lent before the Resurrection, the Nativity Fast before the Lord's birth, as well as the June fast before the feast of the Apostles and the August fast before the Dormition of the Mother of God.

Occasionally, an Orthodox Christian should strive to:

★ take time for spiritual retreat, whether a pilgrimage to a monastery, or to another parish for a feast

Participation in the Mysteries, or Sacraments (baptism, chrismation, communion, confession, holy unction (anointing), marriage) is normal and central to the Orthodox Christian life. Their application and frequency are determined by the local pastor.



LIVES OF THE SAINTS

HOLY DISCIPLES FROM THE SEVENTY – MARK, ARISTARCHUS AND ZENON

Commemorated on Oct 10 / Sep 27

The Holy Disciple from the Seventy – Mark, also

named John, is mentioned by the holy Disciple and Evangelist Luke in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 12: 25, 15: 37-39) and also by the holy Apostle Paul in both the Epistle to the Colossians (Col. 4: 10) and the Epistle to Philemon (Phlm. 1: 23). The holy Disciple Mark preached the Word of God together with Paul and Barnabas and was made bishop by them of the Phoenician city of Biblos. The holy Disciple Mark attained great daring before God, such that his very shadow healed the sick (Comm. also 15 April).

The Holy Disciple from the Seventy - Mark

The Holy Disciple from the Seventy – Aristarchus was mentioned by the holy Apostle Paul in the Epistle to the Colossians (Col. 4: 10) and in Philemon (Phlm. 1: 23). The holy Disciple Aristarchus accompanied the holy Apostle Paul, and afterwards was made bishop in the Syrian city of Apameia (Comm. also 15 April).

The Holy Disciple from the Seventy – Aristarchus

The Holy Disciple from the Seventy – Zenon, a disciple and co-worker with the first-ranked Apostle Paul, was called a "lawyer", – since he was a learned man and led juridical matters in church courts. There is mention about him in the Epistle of the holy Apostle Paul to Titus (Tit. 3: 13): "Take care to send off Zenon the lawyer and Apollos such that nothing be wanting for them". Afterwards the disciple Zenon became bishop of the city of Diospolis (or Lydda) in Palestine.

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SPIRITUAL CONSIDERATIONS

Father is available to meet Monday thru Friday between 8:30am and 3:00pm or by appointment.

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Online Community: Please email Fr. Dave to receive the weekly bulletin via email.

<u>Phone Tree</u> – Please call Fr. Dave to be added. <u>Emergency Sick Calls</u> – Please notify Fr Dave when you or a family member are going into the hospital or having a procedure so he can pray with you and you may receive the Anointing to be fully prepared.

<u>Mystery of Confession</u> – Opportunities are available <u>after every service</u>, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

<u>Holy Communion/Eucharist</u> – The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged for all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not Orthodox may receive *a blessing* from the chalice.

<u>Lapsed Members</u> – You are always welcome home and we want you back! Generally speaking, sincere participation in the Mysteries of Confession, Communion, and regular attendance at the divine services are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

<u>Baptisms</u> – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Father for more details.

<u>Adult Chrismation</u> – New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

<u>Marriages</u> – are only solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays. They are not performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Father ASAP for more details (<u>before</u> arrangements are made for the hall).

<u>Church Funerals</u> – are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual and financial obligations; otherwise burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

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"The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times. The body of a Christian has been sanctified with the Grace of the Holy Spirit, and as such may not be burned. God did not create our bodies for burning." - Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica

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
