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SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: 2 Corinthians 9:6-11

⁷Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God; consider the outcome of their life, and imitate their faith. ⁸ Jesus Christ is the same vesterday and today and for ever. ⁹Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings; for it is well that the heart be strengthened by grace, not by foods, which have not benefited their adherents. 10 We have an altar from which those who serve the tent have no right to eat. ¹¹ For the bodies of those animals whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest as a sacrifice for sin are burned outside the camp. 12 So Jesus also suffered outside the gate in order to sanctify the people through his own blood. 13 Therefore let us go forth to him outside the camp, and bear the abuse he endured. 14 For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city which is to come. ¹⁵Through him then let us continually offer up a sacrifice of praise to

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Gospel: Luke 7:11-16

Jesus Raises the Widow's Son at Nain

¹¹Soon afterward he went to a city called Na'in, and his disciples and a great crowd went with him. 12 As he drew near to the gate of the city, behold, a man who had died was being carried out, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow: and a large crowd from the city was with her. ¹³ And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her and said to her, "Do not weep." ¹⁴ And he came and touched the bier, and the bearers stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say to you, arise." 15 And the dead man sat up, and began to speak. And he gave him to his mother. ¹⁶ Fear seized them all; and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has arisen among us!" and "God has visited his people!"

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Gospel: John 17:1-13 (Holy Fathers) **Jesus Prays for His Disciples**

17 When Jesus had spoken these words, he lifted up his eyes to heaven and said, "Father, the hour has come; glorify thy Son that the Son may glorify thee, since thou hast given him power over all flesh, to give eternal life to all whom thou hast given him. And this is eternal life, that they know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent. I glorified thee on earth, having accomplished the work which thou gavest me to do; and now, Father, glorify thou me in thy own presence with the

glory which I had with thee before the world was made.

⁶"I have manifested thy name to the men whom thou gavest me out of the world; thine they were, and thou gavest them to me, and they have kept thy word. ⁷ Now they know that everything that thou hast given me is from thee; ⁸ for I have given them the words which thou gavest me, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from thee; and they have believed that thou didst send me. ⁹I am praying for them; I am not praying for the world but for those whom thou hast given me, for they are thine; ¹⁰ all mine are thine, and thine are mine, and I am glorified in them. 11 And now I am no more in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to thee. Holy Father, keep them in thy name, which thou hast given me, that they may be one, even as we are one. ¹² While I was with them, I kept them in thy name, which thou hast given me; I have guarded them, and none of them is lost but the son of perdition, that the scripture might be fulfilled. ¹³ But now I am coming to thee: and these things I speak in the world, that they may have my joy fulfilled in themselves.

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When It Comes To Halloween, The Orthodox Church Is Ambivalent.

On one hand, it doesn't have much to say. It is a thoroughly Western, very un-Orthodox celebration. "Halloween" is the Eve of All Hallows (i.e., "saints"), or in more modern

English, "All Saints Day," which is celebrated in Western Christendom on November 1 (the next day being All Souls Day).

For us Orthodox, "All Saints" -- the day that we celebrate the entire gathering of those deified because they loved the Lord with all their heart and their neighbors as themselves -- is celebrated on the Sunday after Pentecost, which is always in Summer.

There never was in Orthodoxy a tradition of celebrating monsters and devils the night before All Saints Sunday.

On the other hand, Orthodoxy is surprised at Halloween's reveling in not only the Night, but also the Fright of the Night. Judging by the sheer popularity of horror in American culture, it seems that people really like to be scared. Maybe it's like the thrill of a terror-filled rollercoaster.

Has ever anyone wondered why there ever was a wish for fear, for horror? Or was it, after all, a minimalization of the abject fear of subliminity, of enormity, of the mysterium tremendum. Is it but a defensive mechanism?

This thrill, though, covers a darker reality. Even all the cute little monsters and devils who come trooping up to the door for treats mask, in their semi-innocent cute-ness, a very hard truth.

The powers of evil -- the demonic -- inflict real and horrible and un-diminishable fear upon the human subconsciousness. And this fear spreads like a virus into every nook and cranny of the fallen human psyche and culture.

We in the evangelical Holy Tradition should mourn for this.

Orthodox Christianity proposes a very different response to the horror of the real demonic. Instead of fear and panic, it advises confidence and outrageous repugnance. "Perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 1.18). "We are more than conquerors through Him that loved us" (Romans 8.37).

When the Lord Himself confronted the demonic, there was no fear. There was no spectacle. Drama was minimized, if not avoided altogether. The Lord described these monsters and devils more as virulent infestations: "Lord of the Flies," He called their chief. "Legion," they once called themselves. There are no demonic names. There is no demonic bureaucracy, no "Goetia," no organized subterranean cult.

Authentic Orthodox exorcisms are never entertaining, never glamorous, never spectacular. No one wants to watch.

Contrary to popular opinion, Satan is not king in Hell -- he is, rather, its most confined denizen, bound and chained by Christ Himself. Depictions of Satan on a throne in Hell are simply errant and non-canonical.

The demonic and the entire antichrist spirit is being exorcised by the Ascended Lord: as they are scoured away, swarm by swarm, they are evicted from the world, never to return.

The Reigning Jesus Christ, Who is seated at the Right Hand of God the Father, will continue doing this until the Day of His Return.

Until then, light your fires outside on October 31st. Enjoy the autumnal revels. Wear pirate and princess costumes and duck for apples. Revel in the pumpkin spice and the leaves of Fall. Wander in the romantic

mist of the mingling of gardens and forests sighing for the echoing Past and calling forth of the everlasting Dawn. Be old and young. Scorn the devils and monsters in contempt and revulsion. In the Name of the Risen and Ascended King, Jesus Christ of the Resurrection, the Son of God.

Trust in the Lord, and do not be afraid: "To my delight the night shall shine -- for the darkness shall never be dark with You, O Lord: with You, the night shall be bright as day, darkness and light one and the same" (Psalm 139.12).

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FEAST DAY FEATURE

COMMEMORATION OF THE HOLY FATHERS OF THE SEVENTH ECUMENICAL COUNCIL (787)

Commemorated after October 24/11

The Seventh Ecumenical Council, convoked by the Empress Irene and met at Nicaea from September 24 to October 13, 787. Patriarch Tarasios presided. The council ended almost fifty years of iconoclast persecution and established the veneration of the holy icons as basic to the belief and spirituality of Christ's Church. As the Synaxarion says, "It was not simply the veneration of the holy images that the Fathers defended in these terms but, in fact, the very reality of the Incarnation of the Son of God." "The second Council of Nicaea is the seventh and last Ecumenical Council recognized by the Orthodox Church. This does not mean that

there may not be ecumenical Councils in the future although, in holding the seventh place, the Council of Nicaea has taken to itself the symbol of perfection and completion represented by this number in Holy Scripture (e.g. Gen. 2:1-3). It closes the era of the great dogmatic disputes which enabled the Church to describe, in definitions excluding all ambiguity, the bounds of the holy Orthodox Faith. From that time, every heresy that appears can be related to one or other of the errors that the Church. assembled in universal Councils. has anathematized from the first until the seventh Council of Nicaea." from the Synaxarion

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LIVES OF THE SAINTS

THE HOLY DISCIPLE PHILIP FROM AMONGST THE SEVENTY

Commemorated on October 24/11

The Holy Disciple Philip from amongst the Seventy (not to be confused with Saint Philip the Apostle from amongst the Twelve, the Commemoration of whom is on 14 November), was born in Palestine. He was married and had children.

After the Descent of the Holy Spirit, the Twelve Apostles made him a deacon in the Jerusalem Church, and with the other six deacons they entrusted him to deal with the offerings of the faithful and attend to the concerns of the widowed, the orphaned and the needy. The eldest among the Seven First-Deacons was the holy Archdeacon Stephen. When a persecution began, and the Jews had stoned the First-Martyr Stephen, the Disciple

Philip departed from Jerusalem. He settled in Samaria, and there he successfully preached Christianity. Among the converts of the disciple was the noted magician Simon who, "having been baptised, did not leave from Philip" (Acts 8: 9-13).

At the command of an Angel of the Lord the disciple set out upon the road connecting Jerusalem with Gaza, and there he met a dignitary of the empress of Ethiopia, whom also he converted to Christianity (Acts 8: 26-39). The holy disciple Philip tirelessly preached the Word of God in many of the lands of the Near East adjoining Palestine. At Jerusalem the Apostles ordained him to the dignity of bishop and sent him to Lydia, where he baptised many. Saint Philip died in old age.

Emergency Sick Calls - Please notify Fr Dave when you or a family member are going into the hospital or having a procedure so he can pray with you and you may receive the Anointing to be fully prepared.

Mystery of Confession – Opportunities are available after every service, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

Holy Communion/Eucharist The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged for all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not Orthodox may receive a blessing from the chalice.

Lapsed Members – You are always welcome home and we want you back! Generally speaking, sincere participation in the Mysteries of Confession, Communion, and regular attendance at the divine services are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

Baptisms – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Father for more details.

Adult Chrismation - New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults

seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

Marriages - are only solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays. They are not performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Father ASAP for more details (before arrangements are made for the hall).

Church Funerals - are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual and financial obligations; otherwise burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

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"The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times.
