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

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SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Nativity Epistle: Galatians 4:4-7

⁴But when the time had fully come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, ⁵ to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. ⁶And because you are sons. God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" ⁷So through God you are no longer a slave but a son, and if a son then an heir.

+++ +++ +++ *Nativity Gospel:* Matthew 2:1-12: The Visit of the Wise Men

2 Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in

the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying, ²"Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East, and have come to worship him." ³When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴ and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. ⁵ They told him. "In Bethlehem of Judea: for so it is written by the prophet:

⁶ 'And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler

who will govern my people Israel.""

⁷Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star appeared; ⁸ and he sent them to Bethlehem, saving, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him bring me word, that I too may come and worship him." ⁹When they had heard the king they went their way; and lo, the star which they had seen in the East went before them, till it came to rest over the place where the child was.¹⁰ When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy; ¹¹ and going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh.¹² And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way.

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Sunday's Epistle: Galatians 1:11-19 **Paul's Vindication of His Apostleship**

¹¹ For I would have you know, brethren, that the gospel which was preached by me is not man's gospel. ¹² For I did not receive it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through a revelation of Jesus Christ. ¹³ For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it; ¹⁴ and I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people, so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. ¹⁵ But when he who had set me apart before I was born, and had called me through his grace, ¹⁶ was pleased to reveal his Son to me, in order that I might preach him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with flesh and blood, ¹⁷ nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia; and again I returned to Damascus.

¹⁸ Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas, and remained with him fifteen days. ¹⁹But I saw none of the other apostles except James the Lord's brother.

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Sunday's Gospel: Matthew 2:13-23 The Escape to Egypt

¹³Now when they had departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there till I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." ¹⁴ And he rose and took the child and his mother by night, and departed to Egypt, ¹⁵ and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfil what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt have I called my son."

The Massacre of the Infants

¹⁶ Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, was in a furious rage, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time which he had ascertained from the wise men. ¹⁷ Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah:

¹⁸ "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled. because they were no more."

The Return from Egypt

¹⁹But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, saving, ¹⁰ "Rise, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the child's life are dead." ²¹ And he rose and took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. ²² But when he heard that Archela'us reigned over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee. ²³ And he went and dwelt in a city called Nazareth, that what was spoken by the prophets might be fulfilled. "He shall be called a Nazarene."

LIVES OF THE SAINTS

The Holy Disciple (From The Seventy) First-Martyr And Archdeacon Stephen

Commemorated on Jan 9 / Dec 27

The Holy Disciple (from the Seventy) First-Martyr and ArchDeacon Stephen was the eldest among the Seven Deacons, established by the

Apostles themselves, and therefore he is called "archdeacon". He was the Christian First-Martyr, and he suffered for Christ at about age 30. In the words of Asterias, he was "the starting-point of the martyrs, the instructor of suffering for Christ, the foundation of righteous confession, in that Stephen was first to shed his blood for the Gospel".

Being filled of the Holy Spirit, Saint Stephen with daring persuasively preached the Christian teaching and defeated Jewish teachers of the Law in disputation. For this the Jews maligned Saint Stephen, saying that he had uttered blasphemy against God and against Moses. Under such charges, Saint Stephen came before the Sanhedrin and the high-priest. He spoke a fiery speech, in which he expounded the history of the Jewish nation, and he boldly denounced the Jews for persecuting the prophets and also the execution by them of the awaited Messiah, Jesus Christ. During the time of his speaking, Saint Stephen suddenly saw the heavens opened and Jesus Christ in glory, standing at the right side of God. He exclaimed loudly about this. Then the Jews, covering over their ears, rushed upon him, dragged him out of the city and stoned him, but the holy martyr prayed for his murderers. Afar off on the heights stood the Mother of God with the holy Apostle John the Theologian, and She prayed fervently for the martyr. Before death Saint Stephen uttered: "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit, wherein O Lord, impute this not to them in sin", - and then with joy he gave up his pure soul to Christ. The body of the holy First-Martyr Stephen, left for devouring by beasts, was secretly taken up by the illustrious Jewish teacher Gamaliel and his son Habib, and given burial on his estate. And afterwards these both believed in Christ and accepted holy Baptism.

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LIVING ORTHODOXY

TODAY THE VIRGIN GIVES BIRTH By Sister Vassa

"O Christ what shall we offer You: for our sake You appeared on earth as man? Every creature made by You offers thanks to You. The angels offer You a hymn; the heavens, a star; the Magi, gifts; the shepherds, their wonder; the earth, its cave; the wilderness, the manger:

and we offer You a Virgin Mother. O pre-eternal God, have mercy on us." (from Great Vespers, Nativity in the Flesh of Our Lord God and Saviour Jesus Christ)

Finally, those of us on the Older Calendar are entering into the great feast of the birth, according to the flesh, (not the pre-eternal birth, of the Father), of our Saviour in Bethlehem. What do "we" offer Him on this occasion? We offer Him one of us, - a human, Virgin Mother, who gives birth to Him in the flesh. In Her we offer Christ ourselves, as human birth-givers to the Word in this world. Because the Most Holy Theotokos is one of us, to whom the Lord "appeared on earth as man," we participate in Her vocation, each of us in our own way.

Let me offer myself up today to receive Christ, Who "for our sake appeared on earth as man." May He be born and shine through, rather than be obscured, in my life, my relationships, and my various responsibilities. "Today the Virgin gives birth to the Transcendent One." And indeed, today the Church gives birth to the Transcendent One. Christ is Born!

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ORTHODOX "WORD" OF THE WEEK

God Sent Forth His Son

The word of the day is "sent." On this glorious day, we hear Paul's concise summary of the gospel in our reading of Galatians 4:4-7. He writes, "But when the fullness of the time had come, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the law to redeem those who were under the law, that we might receive adoption as sons" (vs. 4-5).

How long did it take for the time to be filled up with hours, days, years, and decades (Strong's #4136, 204)? How much suffering did the Chosen People endure as the centuries heaped up one on top of the others? How much perseverance did it take for God's People to maintain their hope in His promise? God So Loved That He Sent His Son

But now we rejoice in the Gospel. History has no more room. The time is fulfilled. The years that God has allocated before He would act has expired. Now we hear the wonderous news that the Almighty God loved the world so much that He "sent forth" His Son (vs. 4).

Note that in this message, the two persons of the Holy Trinity are distinct. The Father "sent" the Son, and the Son "was sent" by God, the Father. Together with the Holy Spirit, the Son is one in essence with the Father. Yet each person of the Holy Trinity has His own identity.

Moreover, the Greek word that Paul uses adds the understanding of the reason that the Father sentforth His Son. The Lord Jesus came to earth as an infant child to achieve the intention of the Father. And He was totally committed to carrying out the tasks for which He came to earth. He said, "But I have a greater witness than John's; for the works which the Father has given Me to finish—the very works that I do-bear witness of Me that the Father has sent me (vs. John 5:36).

The Lord is one in being ("consubstantial") with the Father and the Holy Spirit in his divine nature. Therefore, in both His divine and human natures He is one in will and purpose to the Father. Thus, the Lord said, "I do not seek My own will but the will of the Father who sent me (John 5:30).

The Son of God Put Himself Under the Law

Paul says that the Lord Jesus Christ was "born of a woman, born under the law" (vs. 4). Accordingly, He was duty bound to keep the law. From his circumcision (Luke 2:21), dedication in the temple (Luke 2:22-24), obedience to his parents (Luke 2:51), to His baptism, indeed throughout his earthly life, He willingly "fulfilled all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15) of the law. In summary, "though He was a Son, He learned obedience by the things which He suffered" (Hebrews 5:8).

But what was that law that the Lord perfectly obeyed? It was more than the law of Moses and the obligations of the Chosen People. It was the law that God has written on the heart of every human being who has ever lived. It is the law of conscience. The Orthodox Study Bible calls it the "natural law" (Romans 2:15) (OSB "The Basis of God's Judgement,"15250). By the law that is explicit in the law of Moses and implicit in the law of conscience, the Almighty God will judge each one of the human race. Christ Fulfilled the Law for Us

It was this law in both its "Mosaic" and "natural" forms that Christ came to fulfill for us. God created human beings to live forever in complete harmony with Him and in perfect obedience to His will. But by the sin of Adam and Eve, the whole human race became subject to death and disobedience. In this state of corruption, all humans were helpless to keep the law. But the Son of God was born to undo what Adam and Eve did. Paul writes, "For what the law could not do in that it was weak through the flesh, God did by sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh (OSB Romans 8:3).

Therefore, by being "born of a woman," Christ came to free us from our bondage to the law and the judgment of God according to the law. We were created to be God's children. But because of the disobedience of sin, we were no more than slaves (4:1). But now that Christ has come to obey the law for us, we have been adopted as children of God once again (Galatians 4:7).

In summary, God sent His Son into the world to meet the requirements of the law for us. Therefore, since the law has been fulfilled, we are no longer under the bondage to it. Our human nature is now restored to its freedom. In the Greek text, the word translated "freedom" means "exemption from liability (Strong's #1659, 85). Released from God's judgment by the perfect obedience of Christ, we are free to worship and serve Him with the love which children have for their parents.

For Reflection

We have every reason to be joyful today. In God's mercy, He has "sent forth" His Son to us. In Him, heaven and earth are joined, and our human nature is now restored to the image of God. However, the blessing of His presence among us is only the beginning of the grace that He has come to bring. Thus, today in our study of Galatians 4, we not only hear who the Christ child is but why He came from heaven to earth. Our reading encourages us to consider what He has accomplished for us in His obedience to God the Father.

May your meditation on His coming lead you into further insights into the meaning of His birth. And may He fill your heart with the joy and peace of His presence.

Christ is born. *Glorify Him!*

<u>Lapsed Members</u> – You are always welcome home and we want you back! Generally speaking, sincere participation in the Mysteries of Confession, Communion, and regular attendance at the divine services are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

<u>**Baptisms</u>** – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Fr. Dave for more details.</u>

<u>Adult Chrismation</u> – New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required. <u>Marriages</u> – are only solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays. They are not performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Fr. Dave ASAP for more details (<u>before</u> arrangements are made for the hall). <u>Church Funerals</u> – are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual responsibilities and their stewardship. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. <u>The Church does not</u> permit cremation.

THE CANON OF THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD AND SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST

Ode 1: Christ is born, glorify him! Christ comes from heaven, meet Him! Christ is an earth, be exalted! O all the earth, sing to the Lord, and sing praises in gladness, all people, for He has been glorified. Ode 3: To the Son Who was begotten of the Father without change before all ages, and in the last times was without seed made flesh of the Virgin, to Christ our God, let us cry aloud: You have raised up our horn, holy are You, O Lord! Ode 4: Rod of the root of Jesse, and flower that blossomed from his stem, O Christ, You have sprung forth from the Virgin. From the mountain overshadowed by the forest You came, made flesh for her that knew not wedlock. O God not formed from matter. Glory to Your power O Lord! Ode 5: As You are God of Peace and Father of mercies, You have sent to us Your Angel of Great Counsel, granting unto us peace. So are we guided towards the light of the knowledge of God. And watching by night, we glorify You, O Lover of mankind. Ode 6: The sea monster spat forth Jonah as it had received him, like a babe from the womb: while the Word, having dwelt in the Virgin and taken flesh: came forth from her yet kept her undefiled. For being Himself not subject to decay. He preserved His Mother free from harm. Ode 7: Scorning the impious decree, the three children brought up together in godliness feared not the threat of fire: but standing in the midst of the flame they sang:

For it burned not the children whom it had received, even as the fire of the Godhead consumed not the Virgin's womb into which It had descended. Therefore in praise, let us sing: let the whole creation bless the Lord, and exalt Him above all forever.

Ode 9: I behold a strange and wonderful mystery. The cave has become heaven, the throne of the Cherubim, the Virgin. The manger a noble place where lies Christ our God Who cannot be contained. Let us praise Him in song and magnify You!
