\*\*\* Great Lent 2025 – We are in the last week of the Great Fast. Consider the following Inspiring words by Fr. Jonathan Bannon as we look forward to Pascha:

**Have I attended Confession?** It is offered after every service, on Saturday at lunchtime, or please schedule ASAP so as to be prepared spiritually for renewal of our relationship with Christ.

Have I rearranged my schedule around the holy feasts or plan to for Holy Week? As Orthodox Christians we celebrate the great feasts with joy and love! Holy Week, the holiest week of the year, only comes once a year.

Fasting: How are we doing? Medical needs always come first and we also want to do our best with prayer and renewing our relationship with God. Have you spoken to your Spiritual Father if you are looking for some encouragement? God is watching how we are running the race of the Fast! Remember to do your best and pursue God, not waiting for Him to show up (He is always present), but go to Him.

Make the sign of the cross and recommit to the fast today.

**Remember:** A general guideline for the Great Fast is this: <u>Try to do more than last year</u>. This is an opportunity, not an obligation. May our journey to Pascha be a spiritually beautiful one together!

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\*\* <u>Presanctified Liturgy</u> this week will be here at St. John's on Wednesday. (All 3 North Hills parishes will have services at their own churches)

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\*\*\* Fasting Before Holy Anointing — It is common around the world to fast prior to the Mystery of Holy Anointing (Unction). Please follow the minimum 3-hour fast as we do prior to the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts before coming to the Unction service on Holy Wednesday. We will have a community meal afterwards.

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\*\*\* Red Eggs – The suggestion was made (last year) to hard boil red eggs for the parish during Holy Week after one of the services. In your cooking at home – please save any RED ONION peels or BEET skins for us to naturally dye the eggs. Also – if you are able to bring any home-grown eggs to the church, please let Fr. Dave know as soon as you can.

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\*\* Reading of the Psalms on Good Friday Evening and Holy Saturday Morning – Starting this year, faithful are asked to sign up and commit to reading the Psalms at the Tomb of our Lord. We will begin immediately after the Vespers Service and Burial Procession on Good

Friday, continue until 10 pm, then restart Holy Saturday morning at 8 am until the start of the Vesperal Liturgy (at 9:30 am). Shifts will be 20-minutes long. May these words from the Gospel of Matthew when Jesus prayed in Gethsemane inspire all of us: And he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "So, could you not keep awake with me one hour? Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." (Matthew 26:40-41)

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\*\*\* Pot-Luck Paschal Meal – Our next community pot-luck meal will be following the services on Pascha. All families are encouraged to sign up and bring something to share.

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\*\*\* Blessing of Graves – Our annual grave blessings at the N.S. cemeteries will be on April 27. We will celebrate a Panachida after Liturgy and then head to the North Side after the coffee social. \*\*\* If your loved ones are not at one of the two cemeteries on the North Side, please schedule a time with Fr. Dave to meet (if possible) before the Feast of Ascension.

\*\*\* Panachida Offerings – Reminder: Panachidas (Memorial Services for the Departed) <u>cannot</u> be served on the Major Feast Days of our Lord including Palm Sunday and Holy Pascha (as well as Lazarus Saturday).

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### \*\* (a) meal train Food Ministry at Church:

Meal Train - when someone in our community cannot get to the grocery store or make their own meals (after a major surgery, a new baby, or for any other reason is in need), this program will help allow us to help them! Here is an example: Someone has a major surgery and will not be able to cook for themselves for 2 weeks. They notify Father Dave of this and he sets up an account for them on this website. Someone else from the parish decides to make a big pot of soup and freeze some for the one in need. They can then either deliver the food to their house or bring it to the church on Sunday and someone else will deliver it through the week. #### APRIL COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY

This month, through the efforts of our Sr. ACRY, we will be collecting donations for the **Orthodox Christian Mission Center (OCMC).** This is the organization that puts out the Coin Boxes that we have been using through the Great Fast. Please bring in your coin boxes on Pascha. (There will also be an additional offering requested on our regular last Sunday of the month.) "Let them do good, that they may be rich in good works, ready to give, willing to share" (1 Tim 6:18)

#### LIVING THE ORTHODOX FAITH



#### **Assembling A Traditional Easter Basket**

One begins with a straw basket filling with foods each holding symbolic significance:

#### 1. Easter Bread (Pascha)

A sweet yeast bread rich in eggs and butter, symbolic of Christ "the Living Bread". Usually a round loaf with a golden crust and decorated with a braid and cross. Pascha comes from the word Pasch, meaning Passover. In English we use it to refer to the Easter season. In Slavonic the word paska is used to refer to Christ "the new lamb".

#### 2. Cheese (Rusyn: Hrudka or Sirec)

A special cheese made from egg and milk shaped into a ball having a rather bland but sweet taste indicative of the moderation that Christians should have in all things. It is often decorated with cloves in the form of a cross.

#### 3. Ham (Šunka)

The meat popular with the Slavs as the main dish because of its richness and symbolism of the great joy and abundance of Easter. Some may prefer lamb or veal.

#### 4. Sausage (Kolbasi)

A spicy pork product flavored with garlic, indicative of God's favor and generosity.

#### 5. Butter (Maslo)

This favorite dairy product is often shaped into a lamb or small cross. Symbolic of Christ the lamb who was offered upon the altar of the Cross for the life of the world.

#### 6. Bacon (Slanina)

Uncooked bacon cured with spices. Symbolic of the overabundance of God's mercy to us.

#### 7. Salt (Sol)

Symbolizes the Truth of the message of Christ. Just as salt preserves food, so the teaching of Christ preserves our eternal life.

#### 8. Horseradish (Chrin)

Horseradish mixed with grated red beets. Symbolic of the Passion of Christ still in our minds but sweetened with some sugar because of the Resurrection. A bittersweet red colored mixture reminds us of the sufferings of Christ.

#### 9. Decorated Eggs (Pysankŷ)

Hard boiled eggs brightly decorated with symbols and markings made with beeswax. Eggs were always considered as symbols of the resurrection, the emergence of new life.

\*\*\* We are not limited to only having these items in our basket (nor do we have to have all of them). We fast for 40 days and a tradition is to bring what you have fasted from to the church to bless it before

having some again (i.e. chocolate, or gum, or pop, or

#### The Request of James and John

<sup>35</sup> And James and John, the sons of Zeb'edee, came forward to him, and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." 36 And he said to them, "What do you want me to do for you?" <sup>37</sup> And they said to him, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." <sup>38</sup> But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" <sup>39</sup> And they said to him, "We are able." And Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; 40 but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared." 41 And when the ten heard it, they began to be indignant at James and John. <sup>42</sup> And Jesus called them to him and said to them, "You know that those who are supposed to rule over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great men exercise authority over them. <sup>43</sup> But it shall not be so among you; but whoever would be great among you must be your servant, 44 and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. 45 For the Son of man also came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

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#### THE PRAYER OF SAINT EPHRAIM THE SYRIAN

(in the Ruthenian tradition)

O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. + [Prostration]

But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. + [Prostration] Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

The following triplet is recited 4 times (making a total of 12 bows):

O God, be merciful to me, a sinner. [bow]
O God, cleanse me of my sins and have mercy on me. [bow]

O Lord, forgive me, for my sins are many. [bow] Then the prayer again with only one prostration: O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

#### A Prayer Of Repentance (Psalm 50/51)

Have mercy upon me, O God, according to Your great mercy; And according to the multitude of Your compassions, blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, And cleanse me from my sin. For I acknowledge my iniquity, And my sin is continually before me. Against You only have I sinned, And done this evil before You. That You might be justified in Your words, And prevail when You judge. For behold, I was conceived in iniquities, And in sins did my mother bear me.

For behold, You have loved truth; The hidden and secret things of Your wisdom You have made clear to me. You shall sprinkle me with hyssop, and I shall be made clean; You shall wash me and I shall be made whiter than snow. You shall make me to hear joy and gladness, The bones which have been humbled shall rejoice. Turn Your face away from my sins, And blot out all my iniquities.

Create a clean heart in me, O God, And renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Your presence, And take not Your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of Your salvation, And with Your governing Spirit establish me. I shall teach transgressors Your ways, And the ungodly shall turn back to You.

Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, who are the God of my salvation, My tongue shall rejoice in Your righteousness. O Lord, You shall open my lips, And my mouth shall declare Your praise.

For if You had desired sacrifice, I would have given it; With whole burnt offerings You shall not be pleased. A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit, A heart that is broken and humbled God will not despise. Do good, O Lord, in Your good pleasure to Zion; And let the walls of Jerusalem be built Then shall You be pleased with a sacrifice of righteousness, with oblation and whole burnt offerings; Then shall they offer bullocks upon Your altar.

#### **ONLINE BONUSES**

### EVEN SAINTS CAN MAKE MISTAKES: ST. MARY OF EGYPT

Did you know that even saints can make mistakes? Today we remember a very special saint who made A LOT of mistakes.

When Saint Mary of Egypt was a young woman, she did not even try to be a good person. She had many, many sins and didn't even care. But one day, she tried to go into a holy church in Jerusalem, and she felt a force that would not let her go in! She couldn't see anybody pushing her out, but as hard as she tried, she still could not enter the church.

St. Mary then knew that she had to change her life. She left Jerusalem to live in the desert, where she lived for 48 years! She spent her time there praying and asking God to forgive her. Finally, before she died, she received Holy Communion from a priest who found her in the desert.

Sometimes, when we think of the saints, we might think they were born perfect and were perfect all their lives! But then we know that only Christ lived a perfect life! Today, let's all remember that nobody is perfect. But God still wants us to try to be perfect, like He is! St. Mary of Egypt is a great example of somebody who changed her life so she could follow Christ.

We celebrate St. Mary today, the  $5^{th}\,$  Sunday of Lent.



#### **A Note About The Mystery Of Confession**

Confessions will be heard in front of the Icon of Christ. Confessions will be heard *following every* service, on most Saturdays during Great Lent from **11am – 1pm**, and at other times by appointment (please contact Fr. Dave to arrange this). If you have a regular Spiritual Father, or wish to go to another Orthodox priest to have your confession heard, no problem! but please let Fr. Dave know. Do not wait to plan for your confession! Confessions before Pascha will only be heard *through Holy Wednesday*.

# +++ +++ +++ SUGGESTED GUIDELINES FOR THE GREAT FAST (GREAT LENT):

We are called to increase our *Prayer*, *Fasting*, *and Almsgiving* during this time...

#### PRAYER:

- ♣ Attend as many of the services as possible and be strengthened in community prayer.
- ♥ Come to the Mystery of Confession (offered after every service, on most Saturdays during the Great Fast, or by appointment).
- ♣ Approach the Chalice to receive the Holy Eucharist as often as possible.
- ♣ Also, add additional prayers to your personal *Prayer Rule* at home. (See the attached about reading the Book of Psalms during Great Lent.)

#### **FASTING:**

- ★ The Great Fast begins tomorrow, March 3. This is a day of strict fasting (no meat or dairy products). Likewise, strict fast on Great & Holy Friday (4/18) and Great & Holy Saturday (4/19)
- ♣ The tradition of the Orthodox Church is a strict fast (no meat or dairy products eaten) by all of the faithful for the entire 40 days of the Great Fast and for all of Holy Week.
- ₱ If you cannot physically do this, adopt a fasting rule
  and stick to it for the duration of the Great Fast (see
  Father for some guidance). Here are a few
  examples:
- a) strict fast on certain days of the week while keeping a meat fast on the others;
- o b) fast only from meat;
- o c) fast from meat for certain weeks (Clean Week, Cross Week, and Holy Week); or
- o d) fast from meat on Wednesdays, Fridays, and all of Holy Week (*April 18-23*).
- ♣ The more effort you put forth in your fasting, the more spiritually uplifting your Lenten Season will be!
- A minimum three (3) hour fast from all food and drink for those receiving Communion at the evening Pre-sanctified Liturgy (the regular "midnight Fast" is called for the Liturgies of St. John Chrysostom & St. Basil the Great)
- ★ The sick and infirm are not bound by the fast at any time.

- ♣ Those requiring medications or certain prescribed diets are to follow their physician's instructions.
- ♣ Lastly, the Great Fast is not a "40 day diet program" or simply a "dietary adjustment" (or "label Lent").

#### **ALMSGIVING:**

 $\maltese$  Find a way to give more of your time, talent, and treasures – *give more of yourself to others*.

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# A general guideline for the Great Fast is this: *Try to do more than last year.*



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### LIVES OF THE SAINTS

### THE MONK ZAKHARII THE FASTER, OF PECHERSK

Commemorated on April 6/March 24

The Monk Zakharii the Faster, of Pechersk, pursued asceticism in the Farther Caves in the XIII-XIV Cent. The strictness of his fasting reached such an extent, that he ate nothing baked nor boiled, and he consumed only greens (grasses) – and this only once a day at the setting of the sun. Demons trembled at the mere mention of the name Zakharii. Often the monk saw Angels, with which he merited life in Heaven. The identification of the monk Zakharii, Faster of Pechersk, with the son of the Kievan inhabitant John - Zakharii, who had given all his inheritance for the adornment of the Pechersk temple and become a monk at the monastery, – is unfounded. John before death had transferred his property for maintaining to his friend Sergei. This was during the time when the hegumen was the Monk Nikon (+ 1088, Comm. 23 March). Zakharii at the time was 5 years old. At age 15, that is – not later than the year 1098, he obtained his inheritance from Sergei, in order to give it to the monastery. However, the monk Zakharii - Faster of Pechersk, lived approximately 200 years later.

\*\*\* **STEWARD**, translated from the Greek word oikonomos, means a caretaker, a faithful manager of all of God's gifts. As Stewards, each of us are called upon to respond to God's gifts through offering our gifts of time, talent and treasure. This is our form of supporting our parish and it leaves us with the question, "How will I respond to God's gifts this year?" Our gifts represent who we are and how we care about God and His Church. How can we live with the framework of being a caretaker of the blessings God gives us?

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#### Why Should I Join the Local ACRY?

The ACRY is an Orthodox Christian family fellowship dedicated to the purpose of encouraging spiritual growth through charitable and apostolic missionary works, prayer and fellowship for the Glory

If you miss coming to church for a week, online giving allows you another option to "catch up" on your weekly stewardship. You can also set up a recurring donation online. For our parish to continue it's ministries, outreach, and general bill paying, your generosity and stewardship is needed.

Mystery of Confession – Opportunities are available after every service, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

Holy Communion/Eucharist – The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged for all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not prepared or not of the Orthodox Faith may receive a blessing from the chalice.

How to receive - Please remember the following helpful hints aimed at helping to preserve the solemnity and safety of the Holy Mystery. Anyone wearing lipstick should remove it before receiving. Be sure to offer your baptismal name to the priest before receiving. Please take great care that the red cloth held by the acolytes (servers) is fully under your chin (you should not hold it), then use the centuries-old practice of receiving: please fully open your mouth, tilt your head back, receive the Holy Gifts, wait until They are securely in your mouth and so that none of the holy and precious Body and Blood of Christ is accidentally spilled. Thank you for your cooperation, and may God have mercy on us all!

Lapsed Members — You are always welcome home and we want you to come back! Generally speaking, sincere and regular participation in the Sunday Divine Liturgy and in the Mysteries of Confession and Communion are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

**Parishioners in "good standing"** are those Orthodox Christians who, as members of Saint John's Orthodox Church, strive to live according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church; participate in the life of the parish through regular attendance of services, regular reception of Holy Communion and periodic Holy

Confession (and receive these Mysteries no less than once a year); if married, having been married in the Orthodox Church; and share their stewardship of their time, talents, and treasures which includes financially supporting the parish.

Baptisms – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Fr. Dave for more details.

Adult Chrismation – New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

*Marriages* – are only solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays in the church. They are <u>not</u> performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Fr. Dave ASAP for more details (*before* arrangements are made for the hall). It is critical that marriages are blessed in the church.

Church Funerals – are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual responsibilities and their stewardship. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

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"The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times. The body of a Christian has been sanctified with the Grace of the Holy Spirit, and as such may not be burned. God did not create our bodies for burning." - Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica

Special Intentions — Did you ever wonder for what reasons would a person's name go under "For the Special Intentions of..." on our Prayer Page? A special intention request is very diversified! It could be when one is under extreme job stress, struggling with spiritual issues, infertility, dealing with the loss of a loved one... the list goes on. As with the other lists on our page, one does not have to be Orthodox to be added.

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Prayer requests – During the Great Entrance of the Divine Liturgy, prayers are said for the sick and those celebrating special occasions listed in the bulletin. If silent prayers are requested, they will be offered quietly at the Altar at all services.
