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#### SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: Galatians 1:11-19

Paul's Vindication of His Apostleship

<sup>11</sup> For I would have you know, brethren, that the gospel which was preached by me is not man's gospel. <sup>12</sup> For I did not receive it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through a revelation of Jesus Christ. <sup>13</sup> For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it; 14 and I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people, so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. 15 But when he who had set me apart before I was born, and had called me through his grace, <sup>16</sup> was pleased to reveal his Son to me, in order that I might preach him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with flesh and blood, <sup>17</sup> nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia; and again I returned to Damascus.

<sup>18</sup> Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas, and remained with him fifteen days. <sup>19</sup> But I saw none of the other apostles except James the Lord's brother.

#### **Gospel:** Luke 8:5-15

<sup>5</sup> "A sower went out to sow his seed; and as he sowed, some fell along the path, and was trodden under foot, and the birds of the air devoured it. <sup>6</sup> And some fell on the rock; and as it grew up, it withered away, because it had no moisture. <sup>7</sup> And some fell among thorns; and the thorns grew with it and choked it. <sup>8</sup> And some fell into good soil and grew, and yielded a hundredfold." As he said this, he called out, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear."

The Purpose of the Parables

<sup>9</sup> And when his disciples asked him what this parable meant, <sup>10</sup> he said, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God; but for others they

are in parables, so that seeing they may not see, and hearing they may not understand. <sup>11</sup> Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. <sup>12</sup> The ones along the path are those who have heard; then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, that they may not believe and be saved. <sup>13</sup> And the ones on the rock are those who, when they hear the word, receive it with joy; but these have no root, they believe for a while and in time of temptation fall away. <sup>14</sup> And as for what fell among the thorns, they are those who hear, but as they go on their way they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life, and their fruit does not mature. <sup>15</sup> And as for that in the good soil, they are those who, hearing the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bring forth fruit with patience.

+ + + + + + + + + + + + **Epistle:** Hebrews 13:7-16 (Holy Fathers)

<sup>7</sup>Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God; consider the outcome of their life, and imitate their faith. <sup>8</sup> Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever. 9Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings; for it is well that the heart be strengthened by grace, not by foods, which have not benefited their adherents. <sup>10</sup> We have an altar from which those who serve the tent have no right to eat. <sup>11</sup> For the bodies of those animals whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest as a sacrifice for sin are burned outside the camp. 12 So Jesus also suffered outside the gate in order to sanctify the people through his own blood. <sup>13</sup> Therefore let us go forth to him outside the camp, and bear the abuse he endured. <sup>14</sup> For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city which is to come. <sup>15</sup> Through him then let us continually offer up a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that acknowledge his name. <sup>16</sup> Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

**Gospel:** John 17:1-13 (Holy Fathers)
Jesus Prays for Himself

17 Jesus spoke these words, lifted up His eyes to heaven, and said: "Father, the hour has come. Glorify Your Son, that Your Son also may glorify You, <sup>2</sup> as You have given Him authority over all flesh, that He should give eternal life to as many as You have given

Him. <sup>3</sup> And this is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent. <sup>4</sup> I have glorified You on the earth. I have finished the work which You have given Me to do. <sup>5</sup> And now, O Father, glorify Me together with Yourself, with the glory which I had with You before the world was.

#### Jesus Prays for His Disciples

<sup>6</sup> "I have manifested Your name to the men whom You have given Me out of the world. They were Yours, You gave them to Me, and they have kept Your word. <sup>7</sup> Now they have known that all things which You have given Me are from You. <sup>8</sup> For I have given to them the words which You have given Me; and they have received *them*, and have known surely that I came forth from You; and they have believed that You sent Me

<sup>9</sup> "I pray for them. I do not pray for the world but for those whom You have given Me, for they are Yours. <sup>10</sup> And all Mine are Yours, and Yours are Mine, and I am glorified in them. <sup>11</sup> Now I am no longer in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to You. Holy Father, keep through Your name those whom You have given Me, that they may be one as We *are*. <sup>12</sup> While I was with them in the world, I kept them in Your name. Those whom You gave Me I have kept; and none of them is lost except the son of perdition, that the Scripture might be fulfilled. <sup>13</sup> But now I come to You, and these things I speak in the world, that they may have My joy fulfilled in themselves.

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#### LIVING THE ORTHODOX FAITH

#### Orthodox perspectives on ghosts and speaking to the dead

It is dangerous territory for anyone who desires to follow Christ. Our full focus as Orthodox Christians should be on Christ, and nothing should distract us from that. So, we focus on Christ, and treat/see others the way Christ sees/treats them. We ask for the departed to be granted peace and mercy by God, and trust He will do so, as He desires. We ask the Saints for their prayers, because we believe them to be alive in Christ and with Christ. Any other contact or communication is suspect, because it is so easy for the Evil One to deceive us, given the fickleness of our "feelings", and because it simply takes our eyes off of the One [God] who is supposed to consume our entire existence. - Fr. Marty Watt

In Orthodox Christianity, the perspective on ghosts and communicating with the dead is quite clear and rooted in Scripture and the teachings of the Church Fathers. Here's a structured explanation:



## Life After Death in Orthodoxy

- ♣ The soul continues after the body dies.
- ₩ The dead cannot return to influence the living in normal circumstances.
- ₩ Prayer is offered for the dead, but this is through God, not through direct communication with spirits.

### Orthodox View on Ghosts

- ♣ Ghosts, as spirits of the dead lingering among the living, are generally not acknowledged.
- Apparitions or unusual experiences are often interpreted as demons or spiritual tests, rather than souls of the departed.
- ♣ The Church warns against trying to contact the dead, as this can open one to spiritual harm.

## Speaking to the Dead

- ₩ Practices like mediumship, séances, or talking to spirits are considered forbidden (sinful) in Orthodoxy.
- ♣ The Church teaches that the living should pray for the dead, not try to communicate with them.
- **★** Scriptural support:
- ₩ Deuteronomy 18:10–12 forbids consulting the dead.
- **★** Luke 16 (parable of the rich man and Lazarus) shows the dead are in their place and cannot freely return.

## Encounters with Apparitions

- ¥ If someone sees or feels a presence, Orthodox guidance often suggests:
  - 1. Pray for protection.
  - 2. Seek guidance from a priest.
  - 3. Do not try to summon or speak to the spirit.
- ♣ Saints sometimes had visions or encounters, but these are God-given revelations, not casual contact with the dead.

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#### Another Response:

In the Orthodox Church, the question of ghosts and speaking with the dead is approached with great caution. While the Church does not outright deny that people may experience apparitions, it teaches that the vast majority of these are not truly the souls of the departed but demonic deceptions, permitted by God as a test of faith. The Fathers frequently warn that demons can assume the likeness of the dead in order to sow fear or to tempt the living into superstition. St. Ignatius Brianchaninov, for instance, writes that "the majority of apparitions are nothing other than demonic illusions" (On Prelest). Because of this, the Church strictly forbids any attempt to summon or converse with the dead through mediums, séances, or

occult practices, since these fall under the category of necromancy, which Scripture explicitly condemns: "There shall not be found among you... a consulter with familiar spirits, or a necromancer. For all that do these things are an abomination unto the Lord" (Deuteronomy 18:10–12).

Instead of seeking direct contact, the Orthodox path is to pray for the departed, asking God to forgive their sins and grant them rest. St. John Chrysostom affirms the value of such prayers, saying, "Let us help them as much as we can... by offering prayers and alms on their behalf" (Homily on Philippians 3:4). In this way, the living remain united with the departed in Christ, not through conjuring but through love and intercession. At the same time, the Church makes a clear distinction between ordinary souls of the departed and the saints. We do not seek conversations with the dead, but we do ask the prayers of the saints, who are alive in God and intercede for us before His throne (cf. Luke 20:38, Revelation 5:8). Thus, the Orthodox perspective views most ghostly phenomena as spiritual dangers, warns against all forms of necromancy, and directs the faithful instead toward prayer, memorial services, and trust in God's mercy.

#### +++++++++ LIVES OF THE SAINTS

#### THE HOLY MARTYRS KARPOS, BISHOP OF PHIATIREA. DEACON PAPILA. AGATHODOROS AND AGATHONIKA THE SISTER OF PAPILA

Commemorated on October 26/13

The Holy Martyrs Karpos, Bishop of Phiatirea, Deacon Papila, Agathodoros and Agathonika the sister of Papila, suffered during a time of persecution against Christians under the emperor Decius in the III Century. The governor of the district where the saints lived became aware, that Karpos and Papila did not celebrate the pagan feasts. He gave orders to arrest the transgressors and first to try to persuade them in the veracity of the Roman pagan-religion. The saints answered, that it would be improper to worship false gods. The judge then ordered them to be bound and led through the city in iron chains, and then to be tied to horses and dragged to the nearby city of Sardis.

Agathodoros and Agathonika voluntarily followed after Karpos and Papila. In Sardis they choked Agathonika to death with ox sinews, and beheaded Karpos, Papila and Agathodoros. Saint Papila during life was known for his gift of treating the sick; – after his martyr's death he invariably gives healing to all who have recourse to him with faith.



**Parish Phone Tree** - Please call Fr. Dave to be added. **Emergency Sick Calls** - Please notify Fr Dave when you or a family member are going into the hospital or having a procedure. He will pray with you and you will receive the Mystery of Holy Anointing (Unction) to be fully prepared.

Mystery of Confession – Opportunities are available after every service, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

Holy Communion/Eucharist — The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged for all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not prepared or not of the Orthodox Faith may receive a blessing from the chalice.

How to receive - Please remember the following helpful hints aimed at helping to preserve the solemnity and safety of the Holy Mystery. Anyone wearing lipstick should remove it before receiving. Be sure to offer your baptismal name to the priest before receiving. Please take great care that the red cloth held by the acolytes (servers) is fully under your chin (you should not hold it), then use the centuries-old practice of receiving: please fully open your mouth, tilt your head back, receive the Holy Gifts, wait until They are securely in your mouth and so that none of the holy and precious Body and Blood of Christ is accidentally spilled. Thank you for your cooperation, and may God have mercy on us all!

Lapsed Members – You are always welcome home and we want you to come back! Generally speaking, sincere and regular participation in the Sunday Divine Liturgy and in the Mysteries of Confession and Communion are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

**Parishioners in "good standing"** are those Orthodox Christians who, as members of Saint John's Orthodox Church, strive to live according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church; participate in the life of the parish

through regular attendance of services, regular reception of Holy Communion and periodic Holy Confession (and receive these Mysteries no less than once a year); if married, having been married in the Orthodox Church; and share their stewardship of their time, talents, and treasures which includes financially supporting the parish.

Baptisms – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newlybaptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Fr. Dave for more details.

Adult Chrismation – New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

*Marriages* – are only solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays in the church. They are <u>not</u> performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Fr. Dave ASAP for more details (*before* arrangements are made for the hall). It is critical that marriages are blessed in the church.

Church Funerals — are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual responsibilities and their stewardship. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

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"The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times. The body of a Christian has been sanctified with the Grace of the Holy Spirit, and as such may not be burned. God did not create our bodies for burning." - Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica
